**HARRITY LOSING HOPE.**  
He Feels the Silver Men Will Control the Chicago Convention.

**THE DEMOCRATIC SUB-COMMITTEE.**  
Chicago, June 30.—The sub-committee of the Democratic national committee will meet tomorrow for the purpose of arranging the details of the Chicago convention. The sub-committee consists of Chairman Harry, of Pennsylvania; Secretary Sherwin, of Indiana; Ben T. Cable, of Illinois; J. G. Peacher, of Missouri; F. C. Wall, of Wisconsin; H. C. Wallace, of Washington; T. H. Sherry, of Kentucky. The full national committee will meet on Monday next, Monday, the day before the convention. There have been reports of contests from Michigan, Texas, Nebraska, Nevada and Colorado. Secretary Sherwin stated that so far he has received official notice of none except from Nebraska. The practice has been to credit the party to the extent of participating in the temporary organization, thus referring the entire matter to the convention. It is believed that the silver men have been somewhat apprehensive that the national committee may attempt to override the two-thirds rule. It is also mentioned in connection with the election of the national committee will be asked by the silverites to give them some assurances on this point. **THE NEW YORK GOLD DEMOCRATS.**  
New York, June 30.—The New Yorkers who are going to Chicago to fight for the gold standard have completed their arrangements. A. W. H. He will be joined by Senator Hill at Albany. The Tammany delegation will start on Sunday morning at 9:30 o'clock, having two special trains over the New York Central. Between 250 and 300 will be present. They will make their headquarters at the Auditorium. Mr. Whitney said last night: "The fight is being kept up in the sound money question and there is a great increase in the spirit and determination of the Democrats who are going to Chicago to fight free silver."

**HINRICHS WOULD GRANT NO QUARTER.**  
Chicago, June 30.—Gov. Altgeld and Secretary of State Hinrichs arrived today from St. Louis. The silver men will control both temporary and permanent organizations and adopt a free silver 16 to 64 cent standard. The silver men will not vote for the ticket, so they will be ignored. Last year, when the gold standard was adopted, Hinrichs and I wrote to Whitney and other gold standard Democrats, asking for a conference between the gold and silver men. They were short and curt. They could not think of consulting with so insignificant a factor as the free silver man. They are now, however, changed now. We will not confer with the gold men, because we have nothing to confer about."

**THE DEMOCRATIC CLUBS AT CHICAGO.**  
Washington, June 30.—Lawrence G. Quinn, secretary of the Democratic Congressional campaign committee, also of the National League of Democratic Clubs, left for Chicago today to establish headquarters in the Auditorium. The national association has a membership of 4,500 clubs, with about 50,000 members. It is expected that in this campaign there will be at least 6,000 clubs in the field. On Monday, July 4, a conference will be held in Chicago between the executive committee and the chairman of the state associations. Plans will be arranged for a convention of the clubs in St. Louis on September 20. It is confidently expected that the largest popular gatherings ever held in this country.

Various efforts will be made to induce the governor's presence at various anniversaries and large gatherings.

**Coal Freight Rates Low at Record.**  
Port Townsend, Wash., June 30.—The latest quotations of coal freights are the lowest ever known on the Coast. The British ship Ventura, which arrived in Royal Roads the other day from the Orient, was chartered to load a cargo of coal at Comox, B. C., for San Francisco. The lowest rate was \$1.20 per ton, but the rate from Comox to San Francisco was \$1.50 per ton. The reason for chartering the Ventura at such low rates was that the probability she has been engaged to load wheat for Europe.
