

PROGRESSIVE CHRISTIANITY. By Rev. W. H. G. Temple.

"The shall we know, if we follow on to know the Lord."—Hosea, vi. 2.

Hosea lived in troublous times. The people were given over to idolatry. Hosea was a man of vision, a man of prayer, a man of love.

There are not a good many intermittent Christians in our day who need to be reminded of this principle of continuance.

To bring this rather general statement of my subject into more practical form, I will speak of three classes of Christians.

First, there are those who know God only as a pardoner of sin. Now, I suppose one of the most beautiful moments of His coming to the human soul is when God lifts the burden of condemnation, and Jesus is revealed as the perfect Savior.

There are some who seem to get no farther than the pardoning of their sins. They know God in this capacity, but have not seen His face.

And while we are following up every experience in the knowledge of God, we do not find Him withdrawing from us and hiding in mystery before our eyes.

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But there is danger of halting right here. It is so sweet to be comforted of God that it is so easy to rest in His love and let Him do for us what we should do for ourselves.
