

NATIONAL PARK. Babcock and Turner Among the Geysers.

Livingstone, Mont., July 4. We enjoyed Butte so thoroughly that we returned two days and took in several of the lakes, among them the Grand Coulee in which we spent the greater part of an afternoon, going down to the level, and observing the various formations of the miners. About a dozen of them, notebooks in hand, trying to get their heads around the geological and practical experience in their chosen profession.

Flowers and Snow. Coming over the divide we could see Shoshone lake off to the south, while the great patches of snow were lying in the shade, and in the sunny places flowers were in blossom. I noticed the species of alder's tongue with three blossoms to the stalk. On the Sound I have seen them with two flowers, but never before with three. Just on the divide a little pond, and from one side the water flows into the Pacific and on the other a little stream drains off a small amount of water which eventually finds its way through the Mississippi and the Gulf to the Atlantic. On the divide is a signboard on one side of which is "Atlantic Slope" on the other "Pacific Slope." There are neat signboards and mileposts all through the park, and the visitors cannot lose their way.

THE CASE DELAYED. No Decision as to Saloon Ordinance Till July 13. A MOTION TO DISMISS FAILS. The Receiver of the City of Paris is Retained—Dispute Over Pasture for Cows.

THE EARLY-CLOSING ORDINANCE in the case known as the City of Seattle vs. Charles Pearson, came before Judge Osborn yesterday on certiorari proceedings in respect to the municipal court, where Judge Glasgow had rendered a decision against the validity of the law. Action in respect to the appeal was continued in a motion on behalf of Pearson to dismiss for want of jurisdiction, which motion was denied by Judge Osborn. The case was then continued until July 13, at 3:30 o'clock a. m.

RECEIVER STAYS IN. The application of various creditors of the City of Paris for the removal of Receiver Samuel Rosenberg or the appointment of another receiver to serve with him, came to naught in Judge Osborn's court yesterday. It was shown on behalf of the receiver that he had left H. Lapworth in control of the store during his absence, and that the Grunbaums were acting merely as salesmen. An inventory taken by Receiver Rosenberg shows the following figures: Merchandise \$20,377 14 R. S. reduced to three years; Oscar Springer, assault with a deadly weapon, one year; Terry Chambers, horse stealing, two years.
