Ironclad Oath of the Battery Ram of the World.

IN THE LODGE ROOM.

Foresters of America. Court session, No. 17, installed its officers for the ensuing year at its meeting Tuesday evening last.

The "Battery Ram of the World," he said, "has been striking in the political pot for several months past, was struck by a monsoon a few days ago, and sunk in 250 fathoms of promises."

"I hereby pronounce your name in full and repeat after me: 'I hereby, upon my banded knees, with my left hand supporting the constitution of the United States, and my right hand supporting the stars and stripes, and surrounded by whom I know not, do of my own free will and accord, without any coercion or force, and without any solemn promise, declare and swear upon my honor as a man and by all I hold sacred in this life, and by all the hopes that I may have in the life which may be to come, that I will never reveal any of the secrets of this order to any one except a true and lawful member who can convince a fully sworn investigator as thoroughly as I can to ascertain whether or not he owes his first allegiance to any ecclesiastical power.'

"I further promise and swear that I will protect the honor of a brother's wife, sister, daughter or mother as zealously as though they were my own; and I will promptly, if within my power, notify brotherhood of any threatening danger to himself or family."

"I furthermore swear that should I ever become a candidate for public office, I will not be elected, nominated, elected or appointed to any office, or elected or appointed to any office of any party, that I will never cease in working."

"Furthermore, that I will never speak of anything to the press, or in any way at any time or any place in the known world in the presence of more than one man besides myself, and to him only after he has been fully sworn, and not in a position to be overheard or understood in any way or manner, so help me God."

"That I will use my influence to have laws enacted that will save our government from the pressure of any foreign power of whatsoever kind."

"That I will, under no circumstances, divulge or make known in any way to any one not a true and lawful member of this order, the name of any member of this order, or any other vessel in this fleet (or star), or any other star, who may become a sailor or marine in our ranks; and should I ever be in any connection with this order (or star), I will secretly retire, locked in my bosom, any and all instructions I have received."

"To all these things I bind myself, and no less a penalty than that of forfeiting my life and being published in the world as a traitor to my associates. Amen."
