REV. J. F. ELLIS.

The Man Who Drove out the Echo

and Debt from Plymouth Church.

Rev. J. F. Ellis, D. D., who died a few

days ago at Greenwich, Conn., was

pastor of the Congregational church in

this city twenty years ago. At the time

of his death he was president of Norfolk

college, having assumed that position at

the termination of the institution last

September. His remains were taken to

Norfolk, Neb., the seat of the college, for

interment. It is probable that his widow

will make her home in Seattle, as she has

been very interested in many of our

affairs here.

During his pastorate in this city Dr.

Ellis endeavored himself greatly to his

parishioners, one of whom said yesterday:

"Twenty years ago the first of this

month was a day of small things for

Plymouth church. There was a small

membership, a small building on Second

street, with no basement for a Sunday

school, but an ugly echo and a heavy

debt. Small as the building was, it was

a good deal too large for the congregation.

It was at this time that Dr. Ellis

became our pastor, his first sermon being

a patriotic one with special reference to

the centennial year.

"An unusual man was he, with a firm

and unyielding character, but he settled

himself to work, quietly remarking that

the echo must be gotten out of the building,

together with the debt, and that the

house must be repaired. The result of

his work was indicative of the man. The

seven years that he went in and out

before this people bore witness to the

single-mindedness of his work. He

paid, the echo gotten rid of, a basement

was placed under the building and an

addition put on.
