

EQUALIZATION AT END

After Three Weeks the Board Completes Its Labors.

Many Heavy Advances Made.

South Canal Company Appropriation Water Rights—A Long-Term Lease Cancelled.

The board of equalization, which has been in session in the court house for the past three weeks, adjourned at 4 o'clock last evening, having completed its labors. Yesterday was the banner day as far as the amount of bank was concerned, the board having examined and passed on 11 different cases, in the great majority of which the assessment was raised over the figure returned by the assessor's office. The total amount of the increase in assessment by yesterday's work was in the neighborhood of \$250,000. This following are the principal assessments which were raised:

Northwestern Steamship Company, from \$100,000 to \$100,000; Lewis & Clark, from \$100,000 to \$100,000; Frederick, Nelson & Munro, from \$100,000 to \$100,000; British Columbia, from \$100,000 to \$100,000; Union Trunk Line, from \$100,000 to \$100,000; Sunnet Telephone & Telegraph Company, from \$100,000 to \$100,000; Scandinavian-American Bank, from \$100,000 to \$100,000; MacDougall & Southwick, from \$100,000 to \$100,000.

The largest advance in assessments was reserved for the last, and took place immediately before the final adjournment. This was the raising of the assessment of the Puget Sound National Bank \$100,000 on account of capital stock additions. The amount of this advance has been fully paid up, but not issued. This was done, not by directly raising the valuation of the bank's property, but by directing the assessor to carry forward this item as a supplemental assessment.

Up to yesterday morning the total amount of assessments raised, aggregated \$279,300. Yesterday's work will bring the total to an amount in excess of half a million dollars. After the completion of the work the city members of the board moved and passed the report to the commissioner of assessment, who had presided during the session, and in turn the commissioners, by resolution, tendered their earnest and hearty co-operation in the arduous labors.

APPROPRIATION WATER RIGHTS.

South Canal Company Claims a Big Share of Lake Washington Waters.

The Seattle & Lake Washington Waterway Company, by Eugene Semple, its president, and George M. Paschal, secretary, filed in the auditor's office yesterday a claim as appropriator to the water in Lake Washington to the extent of 80,000 cubic feet per second. This claim is made in the following language:

"Notice is hereby given that the undersigned appropriator claims the water hereinafter described in Lake Washington to the extent of 80,000 cubic feet per second of time for manufacturing purposes at a point on the meander line about 80 feet from the north line of section 10, township 34 north, range 4 east, W. M., and for 60 feet on either side of said point, the same being the place of intended use. The auditor in which said appropriator intends to direct and store said water is by the construction, operation and use of a waterway from a point on Lake Washington where this notice is posted, to wit, at a point on the shore of Lake Washington about 80 feet from the north line of W. M., and for 60 feet on either side of said point westward to the point above described as being the place where it is intended to use such water, and by the construction at or near the point of intended use of such water of all necessary locks and dams.

"Dated at Seattle, Washington, this 15th day of August, 1936."

GETS HIS LAND BACK.

A Thirteen-Year Lease Cancelled by Judge Langley.

A lengthy decree was signed yesterday by Judge Langley in the case of Jeremiah J. O'Connor et ux vs. James R. Smith. The plaintiffs leased this lot to James R. Smith, James Gill and Timothy Ryan for thirteen years, they agreeing to pay

\$100 per month rental and all taxes. Smith sold his undivided one-third interest in the lease to P. J. Rooney, Gill, Smith, Ryan and Rooney did not pay the taxes for 1931, amounting to \$12.20, for 1934, amounting to \$14.25, and a special tax of \$10 levied for the improvement of front street.

The decree awards the plaintiff the restoration of the lease to the original lease, and directs that the amount of the money judgment shall be tried and determined by a jury.

Inventory of the Fruit Canner.

In the case of A. E. Kerry vs. Gold Metal Falcon Canning and Preserving Company, Alphonse Evers, receiver, has filed an inventory showing the valuation of the property to be sold.
