CHOICE OF ELECTORS

Democrats Run a Straight Ticket in Fifteen States.

REPUBLICANS IN FORTY-FIVE.

Tables Showing How the Votes for Electors are Divided Up—The Officers to be Elected on November 3 in All the States—In the Territories the Only Office to be Decided is That of Delegate to Congress.

Chicago, Oct. 25.—The Republicans have a straight electoral ticket in forty-four of the forty-five states, having effected a fusion in the remainder of the "middle-of-the-road" Populists and gold standard Democrats.
