HIS HEAD IS WRONG.

E. E. WILLIAMS, THE KLEPTOMANIAC, WRITES A LETTER. In Jail Pending Trial for Burglary, He Imagines He Is Mixed Up in a Murder Case, and Recants the Post-Intelligencer-McCann and Carey Murder Cases—Mettie Burns' Rapid Downfall.

The captain of the brig Leonesa was evidently pleased with the manner in which the prisoners filled their contract, for in the little memorandum book on page 31, is written the following: "Commenced getting out cargo for Leonesa on Monday, June 1, 1887, and a few pages further along is an account of the amount of piling and square timber delivered to the brig on June 15. This vessel remained in port and furnished employment for the settlers until late in the fall of 1887.

Young Terry's mind, however, was not all taken up with cutting down trees and selling the lumber, for on almost all the pages of the first memorandum book is found this quotation from Byron: "Had we never loved so kindly, Had we never loved so blindly, Never met or never parted, We had never been broken hearted."

On the first page of the other book, under date of Seattle, December 5, 1886, we find where the young man has scribbled the name of his best girl thus: "Miss May, Miss Mary, Russell, Miss Mary J. Russell," and a few pages further along is this memorandum: "Articles for sale, 5 yards line edging, 5 yards insertion to match, 3/4 yard embroidered edging, 1/2 yard muslin, 1 box raisins, 1 box brandy, 1 box whisky, 1 box tobacco, Portland, November 8, 1887."

In the spring of 1882 the settlers at Alki point commenced spying out the land with a view to seeking donation claims for themselves. In February A. A. Denny, William N. Bell and Daniel Boren began exploring around Elliott bay, taking soundings and examining the timber. Piles and timber being the main dependence for the settlers in the beginning, it was important to locate where these could be handled.

By the way, speaking of the late H. L. Yesler reminds me of an incident illustrative of his character. After he had passed his 80th year he was invited to provide at a Republican mass meeting to be held in the Armory, which Judge J. R. Lewis was to speak. At the request of the central committee I had taken charge of the arrangements for the meeting, and among my other duties was to secure a carriage for the presiding officer. When I sent the carriage up to his house, he refused to ride in it, and walking down to headquarters, where I was assisting in getting the torchlight procession fitted out, he said: "This is perhaps the last political meeting at which I shall ever preside, and I do not want to ride to the meeting. I want to march with the boys and carry a torch. I'll march along side of you, and after I am dead and gone you'll put in the paper that Yesler, who was over 80 years old, refused a carriage, preferring to walk and carry a torch, as a proof of his loyalty to the Republican party."

Later she was sent for by St. Mark's Episcopal Guild, at Onondaga, N. Y., thence to Nashville, Tenn., to lecture for the Ladies' Social Society and the churches of that city. She lectured in Columbia, Chattanooga, Franklin and other Tennessee cities, and finally made a tour of the Southern states, lecturing in Louisville, Ky.; Birmingham, Ala.; Savannah, Ga., and elsewhere. She also lectured in New York state and in Ohio. Her last work was done in Colorado, and two years ago she lectured for the St. Luke's church ladies in Tacoma. She is a great friend of Mrs. O. W. Slaughter, president of the State Cooperatives, and has delivered two lectures at the World's fair women's kitchen.

She is happily married to a prominent physician, and has a son, who is assisting him in his work. She believes in practical cookery, and largely in health foods.
