STILL THEY COME! Even Missouri Swinging to McKinley. TO SWELL THE BIG VOTE. Half a Dozen States No Longer Thought Doubtful. BUSINESS MEN CONFIDENT. Awaiting Only the Elections for a Revival of Trade.

Apsey Says the Republicans Will Be Given at Least 325 Electoral Votes, and Bryan Declares Minnesota, Michigan, Iowa, Illinois and Kentucky All Safe, With Excellent Chances for Missouri and Nebraska—Hobart's State to Send a Solid Sound Money Delegation to Congress—Oregon Undoubtedly Will Wipe Out Populism.

From all parts of the United States come repeated and continued assurances that McKinley will be elected president by an unprecedented majority of the electoral college, as well as of the popular vote.

Colorado Republicans Strong. Denver, Nov. 1.—The campaign in this state has been almost devoid of interest, so far as the national ticket is concerned, as a fusion was early effected between the Democrats, Populists, Silver Republicans and the Bryan party.

Gold Congressmen From Alabama, Birmingham, Nov. 1.—Both the Republican and Democratic headquarters here are active today and there is hardly less activity than yesterday.

Connecticut Will Give 30,000. Hartford, Conn., Nov. 1.—Chairman O. R. Filer, of the Republican state central committee, makes the following statement: A complete canvass of the state just completed shows a plurality for McKinley of 30,000.

Maine Still 50,000 Strong. Augusta, Nov. 1.—The chairman of the respective state committees express the opinion that the result in Maine will show a plurality for McKinley of 50,000.

Oregon is Redeemed. Honest Money to Prevail by Not Less Than 4,500 Majority. Portland, Nov. 1.—The campaign in Oregon has been the most exciting in the history of the state.

Rhode Island to Turn Bryan Down. Providence, R. I., Nov. 1.—The Republicans claim the electoral vote of Rhode Island and both members of congress. The Democrats claim and hope for nothing.

IN HOBART'S STATE. Electors and Eight Congressmen All Republicans. Trenton, N. J., Nov. 1.—Chairman Franklin Murphy, of the Republican state committee, declares that McKinley will carry the state by between 40,000 and 50,000.

Wolcott's plurality, 152,636. Secretary Thomas Talbot, of the state Republican committee is predicting a plurality of 140,000 for McKinley in Massachusetts and 100,000 for Wolcott. He says McKinley will get 300 electoral votes.

To Elect Republican Congressmen. Boise, Idaho, Nov. 1.—It is safe to predict the state will give Bryan 10,000 majority, and that the People's party-Democratic nominee for governor will be elected.

Virginia Passing the Dead Line. Petersburg, Va., Nov. 1.—The Republicans appear to be confident of carrying the state, but they give no figures. There is no authentic reports as to the public defection anywhere.

Louisiana Not Entirely Lost. New Orleans, Nov. 1.—The republican party in Louisiana is confident of carrying the state by a majority of 15,000 and 20,000. The Democrats expect to carry all the congressional districts.

Wyoming Probably Republican. Cheyenne, Nov. 1.—The Republican state committee predicts and claims that the McKinley electors will receive a majority of 1,500.

North Carolina and McKinley. Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 1.—The Republicans claim the state for McKinley by 12,000. The Democrats expect to carry all the congressional districts.

Prediction as to South Dakota. Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 1.—National Committeeman Kittredge says McKinley will carry the state by 8,000 to 12,000. He says the Republicans will not lose less than ninety out of 128 in the legislature.

Democrats Give Up Vermont. St. Albans, Vt., Nov. 1.—Everything points to a McKinley victory in Vermont. The Democrats are making all efforts to increase their normal vote in the state.

NO HOPE FOR POPS. All Indications Point to An Utter Rout. STATE REPUBLICAN SURE. Pierce and King Will Make the Majority Large. THE OTHER COUNTRIES ARE SAFE. Nearly All the Sound Money Democrats Will Vote for McKinley.

Silver Majorities Cut to Pieces East of the Mountains, While the West Side Will Roll Up a Big Vote for McKinley, Sullivan and Other Nominees—Farmers Reject the Arguments of the Populists—Everywhere Republicans Are Conspicuous, and Welcome Election Day as a Stepping Stone to Better Times.

All indications point to a Republican victory in the state of Washington tomorrow. The gains during the last month of the campaign have been phenomenal, and encouraging reports have come in from every one of the thirty-four counties in the state.

Pierce and King is wide awake, and since the great demonstration of Saturday it is only a question as to how large the majority will be. The work in King county has been thorough and, the latest advices from both city and county give ground for believing that the country will go Republican by from 1,500 to 2,000 majority.

Careful polls make it almost certain that west of the Cascades the Republicans will have from 8,000 to 10,000 majority, enough to overcome any lead the Populists may bring from Eastern Washington, and sufficient to entitle the state to be ranked among the strong sound money commonwealths of the Union.

Change in Sentiment Among a Republican People. North Yakima, Nov. 1.—Senator North and Charles F. Bunch will close the campaign for the Populists this city tomorrow night. Although the Populists have been claiming 50 majority in this county, there has been a decided change in favor of McKinley.

Large Registration in Omaha. Omaha, Nov. 1.—The registration in Omaha closed last night. The complete returns of the board of registration indicate that nearly 20,000 voters have registered in the seventy-six voting precincts of the city.

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Killed by His Own Posses. Deming, N. M., Nov. 1.—While in Department of bands who have been committing murders and robberies in the Southwest, and in the vicinity of Skeleton canyon, near the Arizona line, Deputy Sheriff Frank M. Galloway, of Silver City, was shot and killed by a member of his own posse, who mistook him for a robber in the darkness, having called out to him and received no answer.

Indiana Populists, Betrayed Into Fusion, Are Instructed Against Bryan. Chicago, Nov. 1.—A Muncie, Ind., special to the Tribune says: The Populist county committee, through its chairman, O. L. Ross, publishes the following call: "To the Populists of Delaware County, Ind.: Believing that the Populists have been outrageously deceived in their fusion with the Democrats, a fusion that means the ruin and utter destruction of our party, hereby warn the members of our party from voting the fusion ticket, and by so doing perpetuate our party."

WHAT CALIFORNIA WILL GAIN. A Home Market for Products After McKinley Wins. San Diego, Cal., Nov. 1.—E. J. Lewis, secretary of the local McKinley club, writes to Maj. McKinley, asking him for an expression relative to California's interests in the campaign. Today Mr. Lewis received the following reply, dated October 25: "My Dear Sir: I am in receipt of your recent favor in regard to the proposed visit of citizens from California to the recent fair honored by the visit. I appreciate the fact that the distance is altogether too great to make the trip. That the citizens of California would take a profound interest in the success of the Republican cause is not at all strange. No section of our country is more reason to support the great Democratic cause than has California. Your state has demonstrated its capacity to raise fruits fully equal to those imported from Southern Europe and from the Southern and Central American republics; and with adequate protection there is no doubt that the fruit industry of the state will be made profitable to a degree that would be of enormous advantage to the people of California."

Women to Vote in Utah. Salt Lake, Nov. 1.—The campaign has closed without any sensational features. It is estimated that the vote of the state will be over 60,000, as the women will vote for the first time at this election. The chairman of the Democratic committee claims that Bryan's majority will be over 6,000; that King, Dem., for congress, will be elected by over 3,000 majority, and that the Democrats will have twenty-seven majority on joint ballot in the legislature. The chairman of the Republican committee does not name the figures on the presidential vote, but says the Republicans will elect the congressmen and carry a majority of the legislature. The People's party expects to poll a strong vote for Foster for congress.

ARMENIANS FOR M'KINLEY. They Adopt Resolutions Indorsing the Republican Nominee. Chicago, Nov. 1.—The Armenians of Chicago adopted a mass meeting in the city hall today afternoon, calling attention to the Armenian troubles in Turkey and urging all citizens of Greek and Syrian origin to vote for McKinley. A delegation of six Armenians started for Canton tonight to present a copy of the resolutions to Maj. McKinley.

Montana Campaign Listless. Helena, Nov. 1.—The campaign just closed has been remarkable for the absence of anything like vigor. The Republican candidate for governor met with an accident early in his speaking tour which compelled his withdrawal from active work. The Democratic candidate for governor went to California to make speeches, and Congressman Charles E. Hartman went East to make silver speeches. He made a few speeches here, and Col. Wm. F. Saunders, Senator Carter and others made a few speeches for McKinley. The Democrats and Populists had several speakers out, but large meetings were not numerous on either side. The fusionists claim that Bryan will get about two-thirds of the votes cast in the state and the fusion state ticket about the
