ILLINOIS IS SURELY WON. It Will Be Republican by Not Less Than 85,000.

MAJORITY OF 10,000 IN KANSAS. Bryan Will Be Beaten in His Own State by 8,000 Votes.

Missouri, After the Hardest Battle Since the War, Republican With 40,000 Votes to Spare—Ohio and Pennsylvania Almost Unanimous.

MINNESOTA, DELAWARE AND NEW JERSEY SAFE FOR SOUND MONEY—THE DAKOTAS THOUGHT TO BE IN LINE, AND THE PACIFIC STATES SAFE—EVEN LOUISIANA IS IN THE DOUBT—LIST—REGISTRATION ALL OVER THE COUNTRY IS LARGE, AND MCKINLEY'S POPULAR MAJORITY WILL BE MORE THAN A MILLION.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—At Republican national headquarters tonight Chairman Hanna gave out the following statement: "I am confident that the strength of McKinley and Hobart in the electoral college as a result of tomorrow's election will not be less than 311 votes."

Our polls, taken by trained men, indicate that we will carry not only California and Oregon, but every one of the Central Western states, including Missouri and Kansas.

There is every reason for us to believe that Texas will cast her electoral vote for the Republican candidates, and that Virginia, Kentucky, Maryland, Tennessee and West Virginia will be found in the sound money column. North Carolina is practically conceded.

Altogether the victory promises to be one of the greatest that has ever been won by a candidate for president.

ILLINOIS NOT DOUBTFUL. It Will Give McKinley From \$5,000 to 150,000.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—On the eve of election the situation is substantially the same as on the previous night. The admission of Chairman Jones that this state should be classed among those in the "doubtful" column has not been over-encouraging to the managers of the state election on the Democratic side.

The Republicans with two or three exceptions, claim every one of the congressmen, all of the state ticket and the electoral vote for McKinley by anywhere from \$5,000 to 150,000. They say that they are absolutely sure of the result of the state and national tickets, as the poll of the state which they have been conducting has been so thorough and so exact that there is very little chance of any estimate made upon it being far out of the way.

The struggle in the Fifth congressional district has been one of the hottest of the campaign, and Congressman White, Republican, who is pitted against E. T. Noonan, the fusion candidate, and John R. McConnell, an independent Republican, is having a sharp fight for election.

California 10,000 Republican. San Francisco, Nov. 2.—The close of the campaign in California finds the Republicans claiming the state. Frank McLaughlin, chairman of the Republican state central committee, claims 10,000 majority for McKinley. It is believed that San Francisco will reverse the majority for the Democrats two years ago of 11,000 and give McKinley a majority. The Republicans claim 5,000 majority in this city.

Illinois Will Carry Nebraska. Omaha, Nov. 2.—The state central committee are tonight comparing figures on state polls and winding up details of the campaign. It is now conceded that there will be much confusion in the state among those desiring to vote for Mr. Bryan, since his electors are designated as "Democratic and People's Independent." The

currency was practically the only issue. The Republicans were thoroughly organized and polled every possible vote, and the result was a Republican majority of about 6,000, the largest in the history of the state. For the November election but little effort has been made by either side in the way of campaign work, it being a foregone conclusion that there will be a slight increase in the Democratic vote, and some reduction of the Republican majorities. The considerable changes are looked for. The Populists and Prohibitionists have electoral tickets of the field as well as the Republicans and the Democrats, but the vote cast for those tickets will be small.

TEXAS ELECTORS SOUND. Will Be for McKinley—Republicans Get Four Congressmen. Dallas, Tex., Nov. 2.—National Committee Chairman Hanna predicts 40 majority for the McKinley and Hobart electors, 20,000 majority for the Populist state ticket, the election of four Republicans and four Populist congressional candidates.

Pennsylvania Almost Unanimous. Philadelphia, Nov. 2.—Pennsylvania tomorrow will elect 22 presidential electors, two congressmen at large in the Twenty-ninth district of the state, 21 out of 29 state senators and a general assembly of 24 members. None of the Republican electors give McKinley less than 20,000 plurality in the state, while many think he will have more than 200,000. All Democrats concede a big plurality for McKinley, but give no votes. Of the thirty congressmen to be chosen, it is believed five, and possibly six, will be Democrats. The incoming legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator J. Donald Cameron, will be about 90 per cent. Republican.

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secretary of state has decided that the Palmer and Buckner organization was the only recognized Democratic party in the state. The Populist party is designated as "Democratic." There is a considerable middle-of-the-road element in the Populist ranks. Republican leaders who were claiming the state by a small majority two weeks ago are now confident that McKinley's plurality will run upwards of 100,000, and some even place it as high as 200,000. The most accurate poll that has ever been made in Nebraska shows a Republican majority of 8,000. The impression of Republican leaders here has become general among gold standard men during the last two weeks has had no small effect upon the hesitating voters, and the reports of the workers in the various precincts are in the highest degree encouraging to them, they claim.

Ohio Solid for Sound Money. Cincinnati, Nov. 2.—There were meetings throughout Ohio and Kentucky to-day, and the result will be a Republican victory in certain quarters. There is more interest taken here in the result of the election than in Ohio. The Republicans generally concur in the office statement of Chairman Kurtz that Ohio will give McKinley a larger plurality than it has ever given any candidate for president. The Republican county committee claims that Cincinnati will give McKinley over 20,000 plurality, and that the county will not reduce it any.

McKinley Safe in Delaware. Wilmington, Del., Nov. 2.—National Committee Chairman Hanna predicts McKinley will carry the state by 2,000 plurality. Chairman Cochran concedes the state to McKinley, and predicts the triumph of the entire Republican union ticket. New Jersey Is All Right. Trenton, N. J., Nov. 2.—The election in this state tomorrow bids fair to be unusually quiet. No state officers are to be elected, the ticket outside of the national one including a number of state senators in eight districts and a full house of the assembly. Chairman Murphy, of the Republican state committee, is confident that McKinley will carry the state by 2,000 plurality. The Democrats will make local efforts in the Fourth congressional district.

Arizona Republicans Hopeful. Phoenix, Ariz., Nov. 2.—Arizona votes tomorrow for a delegate to congress, for members of the legislature and for county officers. Three candidates are in the field for delegate to congress. The Republican candidate is making a fight squarely on the issue of sound money. The Democrats will make money Democratic and Populist candidates will divide the free silver vote. The election is sure to be very close.

South Carolina Hopelessly Bryan's. Columbia, S. C., Nov. 2.—This state will go for Bryan by 40,000 or 50,000 majority. Democratic nominees from governor to coroner will be elected. The Republicans concede this, and say their only chance is to elect Bryan by 20,000 majority. The new constitution, which has reduced the Republican vote to less than 30,000.

West Virginia 2 to 1 on McKinley. Wheeling, W. Va., Nov. 2.—The Republican managers maintain tonight that McKinley will carry the state by 20,000 to 30,000. The Republicans claim all four congressmen and the Democrats concede them all but one. The state will be carried 2 to 1 on McKinley carrying West Virginia.

Forecasts in Other States. Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 2.—Tonight both of the state chairmen are confident of carrying the state, but in the latter McKinley in Rhode Island 2 to 1. Republicans claim the state by 15,000 to 20,000 majority.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 2.—The Republicans tonight claim the state is safe for McKinley by 15,000 to 20,000. Milwaukee, Nov. 2.—At Republican headquarters Chairman Hanna claims a vote of 60,000, and says every congressman will be Republican and that the

legislature will be Republican by 102 on joint ballot. Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 2.—The voting tomorrow is simply for electors, and returns are expected early. Chairman Morrill's prediction of 60,000 seems to strike Republicans favorably.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 2.—There is practically no change in the political situation in Rhode Island. McKinley is expected to carry the state by 15,000 to 20,000 majority. Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 2.—Chairman McMillan, of the Republican state committee, today authorized the state central committee to place McKinley's plurality above 75,000, rather than below that figure.

Petersburg, Va., Nov. 2.—Conservative forecasts give the state to Bryan by 20,000. Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 2.—While the Republicans are claiming the state for McKinley by 30,000 up to 40,000, the Democrats still claim to regard these claims seriously, but feel comfortably sure of Bryan carrying the state by 30,000 to 40,000.

Augusta, Ga., Nov. 2.—It is expected that the Democrats will carry the state by 50,000 majority. Populists as a rule will vote for Bryan. Jacksonville, Fla., Nov. 2.—The indications point to a quiet day with a light vote, the election of the regular Democratic candidates for presidential electors and two Democratic congressmen being conceded.

New Hampshire Will Go 20,000. Concord, N. H., Nov. 2.—On the eve of election in New Hampshire there is no outlook. Republicans are increasing the size of their claims as to majorities in presidential and gubernatorial candidates, but are not so confident with regard to local offices. The Democrats are making a very energetic canvass on the issue of sound money, and may make some gains over two years ago on these lines. It is the general expectation that McKinley will have 20,000 plurality in the state.

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SULLIVAN TO WIN Pierce Will Cast a Big Vote for Him.

AND GIVE A LEAD OF 2,000. McKINLEY'S PLURALITY 1,000, AND COUNTY TICKET SAFE.

THE SAME STORY EVERYWHERE. Counties West of the Mountains Solid for Sound Money.

Spokane Republicans Have Waged a Gallant Fight and Made Great Gains During the Last Few Days—The Populists Beaten in Kittitas—The Battle in Thurston Already Won—Local Polls Only Confirm Former Reports of Substantial Republican Gains Everywhere—After a Masterly Campaign the Sound Money Men Feel Confident That the State Will Cast Its Vote for McKinley and Sullivan by a Large Majority.

Tacoma, Nov. 2.—Special.—"Pierce county will give McKinley 1,000 majority. The county ticket will receive perhaps 200 more majority, and the state ticket will carry the county by 1,000. It is entirely probable that Sullivan will receive 2,000 majority in Pierce county."

This is the prediction of Judge Fremont Campbell, chairman of the Republican county central committee, made tonight to the Post-Intelligencer correspondent. Under the direction of the county committee a very careful poll of the county has recently been completed. This poll shows a majority over the fusion forces of nearly 1,000. This is a very conservative estimate, owing to the fact that in all cases the doubtful voters were credited to the opposition. In cases where a voter's political faith was not obtained or where they refused to give their politics, they were invariably credited to the Populists. Of course the Republicans will get a large percentage of these doubtful ones, and this fact leads to the belief that McKinley's

majority in Pierce county will go over 1,000. The figures on which Chairman Campbell's forecast is based are made from the most thorough and careful poll ever taken in the county. They are therefore unusually reliable.

Giving the fusion electors 3,000 of the county, the Republicans will have a majority of 1,000. Turning back to the election in Tacoma last spring, when the Republicans met the first fusion party, the state ticket carried the Populists on the Citizens' ticket fell behind Fawcett over 700 votes. Add 100 for the county, and it can be easily seen that Rogers will not poll the entire vote of 2,700 votes. To be liberal, give Rogers 300 more, and yet he still falls behind Sullivan 2,600 votes. The campaign which closed tonight has been the most remarkable in Pierce county, as has been the case all over the country. From the beginning the Populists have claimed the county by a large majority, but the fact that during the last week of the campaign they centralized their efforts in Tacoma and were frantic in their exertions to stem the tide that set in against them two weeks ago, is good enough evidence that their previous claims were based on vagaries as ephemeral as the stock arguments.

The Populist committee has made a poll of the county, and they only claim a majority in the country precincts of 250. The Nineteenth senatorial district lies entirely outside Tacoma and comprises the larger part of the country precincts. Reliable estimates received within the past few days indicate that the district, which includes Lewis, Sumner, Granger, Buckner, Carbonado and Wilkeson, will give the Republican ticket a majority of at least 100. At the worst the district will not be lost but by the narrowest margin. The country side from the Nineteenth district will give the Republicans enough of a majority to entirely offset any loss in the Nineteenth.

From the first week of the campaign there have been steady Republican gains throughout the country, one to the splendid work of the speakers and to the well-directed efforts of the county committee. The Populists have claimed the county by 200 per cent. in all the precincts. In many precincts where the added vote of the Democratic and Populist parties was shown, the Populists have been made to completely offset the Populist advantage and bring the precincts into the Republican column.

The majority if not all of the legislative ticket will be elected in this county. Although the Populists have claimed that they would elect their candidate for state senator in the Nineteenth district, the

success of the Republican candidate, J. C. Taylor, is assured. Stanton Warburton, of the Twenty-ninth district, is also a Republican candidate in the Twenty-second district. The closing meeting of the campaign was held at the Tacoma theater tonight. The speakers were W. L. Jones and C. W. Seymour. Sound money Democrats gain nothing by voting for Palmer. If they vote for McKinley they may save the country from panic, repudiation and disaster.

Spokane Almost Conquered. Camp of Daily Occurrences. Spokane, Nov. 2.—Special.—The close of the campaign finds the Republicans united and fighting on a solid platform. A fine distinction has been drawn here between the terms Populist and People's. The Populist, misquoting though he is, is devoted to principle. The People's man doesn't worry about principles—he is in it for the spoils. The Populists of this section of the state see nothing for them in the alleged compromise made at Olympia. They say: "The Populists took all the gain and left us, the pioneers of the movement, to hold the bag. They took the office and appropriated the campaign funds to themselves and left us to do the voting. We are going to do the voting, but we will do it in such a manner that they will wonder what has become of them."

Feeling that they have been refused every time they asked for recognition and broad-based support, they turned to the Populist bosses, the Populists have openly bolted the fusion ticket, and through their organ, the Northwest Tribune Rural, declared their hostility to the ticket of office seekers which was thrust upon them at Ellensburg. This paper has a wide influence among the rank and file of the Populist party in this section of the state. The Populists since its birth, the defection from the fusion party of this paper and those Populist leaders whose opinions it expresses will mean a loss of several hundred votes for the fusion ticket in state and county and a consequent gain to the Republicans.

The Populist bosses say they will knit every Populist on their ticket as a return of the compliment, and have in some instances turned their attention from fighting the Republicans to making a personal fight on the Populist nominee. Fusion has turned out to be a failure. On the other hand, the harmony within the Republican ranks is complete. This city is naturally Republican on the tariff issue, and those who have been the phantom of free silver through the campaign are returning to their old party home.

The local Republican speakers in Spokane county and all over the eastern part of the state have made a noble fight in what are their localities. They have been rewarded beyond their highest expectations. When the polls close tomorrow night the crowd of the balloting will show several hundred votes that only a small Republican majority west of the mountains will be needed to swing the state in line for McKinley and Sullivan.

Estimates based upon polls brought up to date, from all the counties in this part of the country, show the Populist campaign for the past week.

Spokane, Nov. 2.—Special.—The success of the Populists went into the campaign continues a topic of conversation, and the fusionists are everywhere dejected. A large percentage of the paraders were un-enthusiastic in the campaign, and the crowd, causing the line to be extended.
