The presidential party took luncheon at the capitol after the official exercises on the inaugural island and before starting to the White House, the escorting legion in procession swept in columns before the platform. Thousands who thronged the terrace still held their positions until the party fairly moved.

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

He then took his seat. The press against the stand was so terrific that women screamed with pain and the president-elect, it was 11:30 when the parade from the senate continued. All the time 40,000 people were straining to keep up the tremendous applause.

Solemn Oath Administered. Mr. McKinley arose and bowed, and while Chief Justice Fuller in flowing robes administered the oath. The new president kissed a large gilt-edged Bible presented by the bishops of the African Methodist Episcopal church. The people continued to roar. Holding the manuscript in his hand, he turned to the multitude and, lifting up his hand as if in admonition for order, began the inaugural address.
