

AGAINST THE PLAGUE

LOCAL HEALTH OFFICERS GETTING READY TO QUARANTINE.

To Protect This Country From the Disease-Stricken Ports of Asia—No Definite Action to Be Taken Until the Council Takes Action on the Appointment of Dr. Newlands to the Board of Health.

The action of the city council in postponing definite action on the nomination of Dr. George Newlands to succeed Dr. J. J. Sturgis as the third member of the board of health has seriously interfered with the prompt settlement of a matter of great importance.

Some time ago the board of health of San Francisco declared a quarantine against all ports in Japan and China in which smallpox and the plague are endemic. Surgeon-General Wyman, of the United States, has recognized Seattle as being in direct communication with the Orient and has written to the board of health asking that it be authorized to give the matter serious consideration.

It was his intention," continued Mr. Holmes, "to have a special meeting of the board today to give this subject due consideration, but the city council upset our plans by deferring action on the nomination of Dr. Newlands, and the worst of it is that the adjournment was for two weeks, which will make it March 15 before we know what action the council will take.

As for myself I do not care to take action on this matter until the next meeting of the board takes place. He has three years of service before him and ought to have to say as to what shall be done. We have received a letter from S. D. Brooks, of the marine hospital service at Port Townsend, and it looks as if splendid protection was already given against the introduction of the dread disease. Late reports indicate, however, that smallpox is on the increase at Kobe, Japan; and that the plague is becoming troublesome at Hongkong and Shanghai, China. It now becomes a question to decide whether we will supplement the efforts of the United States quarantine at Port Townsend."

Following is the letter written to Health Officer Eames by Mr. Brooks, of Port Townsend:

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your inquiry of the 14th inst., for the Seattle board of health, relative to quarantine work at this port.

"I will reply briefly to your inquiries and state what is being done here, and will forward you under separate cover a copy of the quarantine laws and regulations, which serve as a guide for all national quarantine stations. In addition to what is given in this pamphlet, orders have been recently received to make the provisions laid down in the regulations applicable also to the plague, and to make fifteen days the period for detention of all persons who have been exposed to this disease.

"As to the work for the protection of Puget sound: All acts are guided by the latest news obtained from foreign ports, cablegrams from United States consuls in the event of an outbreak of any epidemic, and the reports from the same officers; also the bills of health of every vessel, under penalty, must be obtained from each port of departure. United States Sanitary Inspector Stuart Elfrede, M. D., at Yokohama, is now dispatching baggage to all Japanese steamers here are now taken to the quarantine station and bathed and their baggage disinfected by steam, unless the latter has been done in Yokohama or at the Victoria, B. C., quarantine. All Chinese steamer passengers and their baggage are treated in the same way whenever bills of health or other information show that they are liable to the spread of cholera, typhoid, or other diseases. All Japanese baggage was steamed from May, 1896, until late in the fall, when reports showed that the danger had ceased. All Japanese baggage has been steamed since the outbreak of smallpox in Higo (Kobe) and other places, and is treated in the same way whenever the bill of health shows there was quarantine at the port of departure. Of course great care is devoted to the subject of vaccination as well.

"Whenever any ship arrives having had quarantaine disease aboard on the voyage, the ship itself and all its cargo are mechanically cleaned, and all on board are quarantined and their baggage steamed, and all are detained the required number of days (see regulations) since it is possible that the ship or cargo may contain the disease. Since the case of the steamship Victoria is probably fresh in your mind, I will state that the ship after such positive statements as to perfect isolation of the case of smallpox, in the person of a passenger, and the impossibility of any exposure on the part of the officers, that the officers were allowed to proceed to their homes. The latter was carefully cleaned and disinfected, while the crew and steamer passengers were quarantined at the Victoria, the latter at Victoria and then at this quarantine, where they still remain. The outbreak of smallpox in the person of an engineer shows the fallibility of trusting at all to isolation on board ship, and no such allowance will be made again, no matter how much it may seem to inconvenience the commerce of Puget sound.

"Every vessel from a foreign port (Canada excepted when there is no infectious disease) is quarantined and its cargo is boarded inspected, before she is permitted to make entry at any United States port. Thus no vessel from a foreign port can enter at your city or be boarded until this inspection has been accomplished here.

"In answer to another question of yours, I can say that no foreign port enters the attention of the representatives of the consuls or sanitary inspectors, who make careful records on the bills of health.

"As stated earlier, the rules I send you are the same for Port Townsend, San Francisco and all other quarantines in this country.

"I have written you very hurriedly and in a somewhat desultory way, but will gladly answer any further questions, and opportunity to make inspection of the government plant for disinfections can be readily made available at almost any time when there are no persons or ships undergoing detention."

Her father is a Pacific coast pioneer, and knows personally all the men who have become famous since the days when the gold metal was discovered in the mines that are now known the world over. He is a brilliant writer and journalist. Mrs. Smart lived with her parents in Carson City, Nev., for a number of years. She has been a resident of Seattle for thirteen years, a good portion of which time she has spent in the home of her father, who is universally respected and spoken of as a noble woman and good mother.

She leaves, in addition to her father and mother, five sisters, Mrs. George M. Stewart, of Seattle; Mrs. H. B. McAvoy, of San Francisco; Mrs. J. B. Loughary, of St. Helena; Miss Emma Parkinson, of San Francisco, and Miss Eva Parkinson, of Seattle. She has two brothers, E. J. and J. P. Parkinson, both residing in Seattle. She leaves three daughters, Gertrude, Edna and Hazel, the eldest being 13.
