

Judgment in a Fishback Suit.

Judgment was yesterday rendered against the Scandinavian-American bank and for the receiver, in the following grounds: First, misconduct of the jury; second, insufficiency of the evidence to justify the verdict; and that it is against law, third, each of law occurring in trial and excepted to at the time by the defendant; fourth, that the special findings submitted by the defendant are contrary to the general verdict and are inconsistent with the verdict and with each other.

Frank August Svenson yesterday commenced an action in admiralty, libelling the British ship Marlborough Hill, her tackle, apparel and furniture. The complaint recites that December 28, 1935, he was employed as carpenter by the captain, William Lang, while the vessel was at the port of New York.

MAKES A VACANCY.

SERGEANT TEMPLETON RESIGNS FROM THE POLICE FORCE.

He Sends a Letter to Chief Reed From San Francisco—Off on Thirty Days' Leave of Absence to Visit His Sick Mother at Cleveland, He Turns Up in California—Police-men in Line for Promotion.

Chief of Police Reed received the following letter last night, dated at San Francisco, March 16:

"I resign as sergeant of the Seattle police department, to take effect at once."

"GEORGE A. TEMPLETON."

The chief was greatly surprised. He knows of no reason why Mr. Templeton should resign, and does not attempt an explanation. It is a most peculiar case and will undoubtedly give those connected with the police department, and also their friends, something unusually interesting to talk about.

Two or three weeks ago the Post-Intelligencer announced that Sgt. Templeton had been granted a week ago to absence to visit his home in Cleveland, O. It was expected that he would make a trip to Chicago on business before returning to Seattle.

The serious illness of Sgt. Templeton's mother was supposed to be the foundation for his application for leave. Immediately after the chief granted Mr. Templeton's request, he became almost a stranger at headquarters. He did not leave the city for several days, and, in fact, it was not known around Chief Reed's office when he did go.

It is said that the chief was surprised to hear that Templeton had returned to San Francisco, and to cap the climax, his resignation came last night from the same place. It will be accepted.

Sgt. Templeton is one of the best known men that ever wore the blue coat and brass buttons of the Seattle police force. He has seen continual service for about seven years, and on account of his fine appearance and ability, represented Seattle on the police force at the World's fair. When Bolton Rogers was chief of police the first time, during the mayoralty of Harry White, Templeton was a lieutenant against the Democratic reform government, with Mayor Ronald at its head, a full range of the latest mixtures, 60 a yard.
