

NEWS FROM TACOMA.

REPUBLICANS CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS AT TODAY'S ELECTION.

Lively Fight Between Harris and Smith in the First Ward—Judge Carroll Rules Against the City in an Important Grade Tax Case.

TACOMA, April 5.—Eight members of the city council will be elected tomorrow.

In all of the eight wards of the city there are two tickets in the field, Republican and Democrat.

The campaign has not been particularly brilliant. Both sides have depended almost entirely on a house to house and personal canvass.

No great question in municipal government has been fought over the result, it is expected, will be a quiet election.

The indications for Republican success are very bright. Perhaps the hottest fight has been made in the First ward.

The fusion candidate is Councilman Harris, formerly a Republican. Harris has served two terms in the council, during which time he has done little except to be in the "opposition."

While Mr. Harris formerly had a firm hold on the voters of the First ward, it is believed that in the election tomorrow he will meet a Waterloo.

On the other hand, R. B. Smith, the Republican candidate, is very popular with all classes in the First, and has earned a fine record for fair dealing and business capacity in his present position as manager of the Puget Sound Flouring Mill.

Councilman Norton will be elected in the Second ward without a doubt. In the Third, L. H. H. is the favorite.

Fourth ward, it is expected, will be won by fair prospects of winning, although the ward has a fusion majority.

In the Fifth, Chris Ebert is running well. Councilman Kiehl will probably be elected in the Sixth, and in the Seventh Candidate Gifford should triumph over his fusion opponent.

Councilman Whitty will be elected in the Eighth, with hardly a possibility of a doubt against him.

MANY THOUSANDS INVOLVED. Tacoma May Lose \$400,000 on a Grade Tax Decision.

TACOMA, April 5.—A decision rendered today in the superior court by Judge Carroll, if it is sustained by the supreme court, will cause the city of Tacoma to lose between \$20,000 and \$400,000 in street grade assessments.

Judge Carroll handed down the opinion this afternoon in the case of the National Bank of Commerce against the city of Tacoma.

The bank sought to enjoin the city from assessing its property near the foot of Fifteenth and Dock streets for the cost of improving the street.

The original assessment was declared illegal two years ago for various reasons, chief of which was the irregularity of the proceedings.

A large number of cases involving similar questions have been decided against the city of Tacoma, which has had much the same experience in this line as Seattle and Spokane.

Under the law passed by the legislature of 1886, by which it was intended that the city should pay for the improvement and collect the amount of the original assessment, the city began proceedings to reassess the property of the plaintiff.

The bank brought suit to enjoin today the court sustained the plaintiff in a decision in which it is held that the statute of limitations is a bar to reassessment.

For other reasons the court decides in favor of the bank, but lawyers are most interested in the clause in the decision in which the court announces the new doctrine, holding that the statute of limitations bars any further proceedings on the part of the city.

The matter will be passed upon by the supreme court.
