The jury in the case of the Bay View Brewing Company vs. Charles Lykjenburg brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for the sum of \$222.10.

The case of C. Underwood vs. Ellen Leasona White Little and H. W. McNeill has been compromised and dismissed from court on the motion of the plaintiff.

In the suit of Mary A. Denny et al. vs. the Northern Pacific Railway Company, Judge Moore yesterday ordered a decree for Mrs. Denny and Mrs. Frye.

John S. Jurey, sr., has judgment for \$1,300 and \$100 attorney's fee, against James M. Smith and Mrs. Frye.

F. B. Ingersoll and Melvin G. Winstock each filed notice of attorney's lien on the judgment in the case of the Witt-Gardner case, which was signed yesterday by Judge Benson.

Hermann Klaber has judgment by default against Ned Carlson. Judge Moore yesterday ordered a decree for Klaber for \$1,125.00.

Several more affidavits were filed yesterday in the case of John B. Hart, as deputy prosecuting attorney, filed one stating that he was present at the preliminary hearing before Justice Ingersoll on March 25, that at that hearing a jury was empaneled, fined and marked "J," and that he turned it over to Deputy Atwell to be produced at the trial in the superior court.



Can License.

Judge Bogue of the municipal court, handed down a decision yesterday in the case wherein fifty-three second hand men are contesting the validity of the city ordinance by which they are required to pay a license of \$2.00 for the privilege of doing business.

The second hand men contended that the ordinance dealt with two subjects, and that in more than one respect it violated the municipal court's ruling of the state supreme court, "to regulate" included the right to license, inasmuch as the right of the city to license is a public right, and the city is not a corporation, but under the provisions to regulate and control, the right to license has never been denied by the supreme court, but, on the contrary, has been upheld.


