

HEADSMEN MAY GET IT

Governor Whetting His Knife for the Board of Control.

Readily Admits That the Members Are Displeased With the Injection of Politics Into Educational Institutions—Board is Now Paving the Way to Become Absolute-Superintendent Westendorf, of the Reform School, is Slated for Removal.

Special Dispatch to the Post-Intelligencer. OLYMPIA, May 4.—The relations between the governor and the board of control led to an interview with the executive by the Post-Intelligencer correspondent today.

"If I have, it is not the first mistake of my life nor will it be the last." The governor further said that he, for one, was not in favor of removing men from positions in the state educational and other institutions for political reasons only.

Attempt to Become Dictators. The board is making an effort to adopt such by-laws as will enable the board to make a list of appointees to the situations in the state institutions under its jurisdiction.

Reason for this move on the part of the board is the dismissal of all the old attendants at the Western Washington Hospital for the insane by Dr. Goddard, the newly appointed superintendent.

It is almost certain that S. H. Barbee, of Olympia, will be appointed accountant at the Steilacoom asylum.
