

NEWS FROM TACOMA.

STATE GRAIN INSPECTOR IS SUED BY MERCHANTS. Their Object is to Protect the Appropriation—South Eleventh Able to be Fenced Up on Account of a Judgment—Japanese Man-of-War to Arrive Early in July.

TACOMA, May 12.—The merchants of this city do not propose that the fund set apart by the legislature for the purpose of inspecting the grain that comes into this city shall be used in paying the salaries of the grain inspector and his deputies.

Associated with Birmingham are a number of other grain merchants doing business in this city. A petition requesting the issuance of a temporary restraining order restraining Chief Inspector Wright from incurring expenses not covered by the special appropriation, and also restraining Cheatham from issuing and Young from paying any warrants drawn from the grain inspection fund, accompanied the complaint.

THE REMAINS NOT CLAIMED. Victoria Man's Body Uncalled For in New York—Was in Transit to England. VICTORIA, B. C., May 12.—In the terrific gale of Sooke harbor on the southern coast of this island, the little steamer Spinnaker was totally wrecked just six weeks ago, and Arthur Scroggs, her master, met his death. His mangled body was picked up in the sea three days later, and, having no friends or relations in this country, the young widow had the remains carefully embalmed, and on May 1 started with them for her own home in New York.

LIABLE TO THE STATE FOR PENALTY AND INTEREST. Attorney General Makes a Ruling on Delinquent Taxes—The Decision Means a Material Increase in the Revenue of the State—King County Will be Obligated to Turn Over About \$25,000, and Other Counties Smaller Sums.
