ANSWER TO JAPAN

MR. SHERMAN DEFINES THE ATTITUDE OF THE UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, July 2.—A special to the Tribune from Washington gives the following text of Secretary Sherman's answer to Japan's protest against the annexation of Hawaii by the United States.

"This recital is of itself proof that your government has misapprehended the statement made by the Hawaiian king in my note, and in its relation to the treaty which involved strongly suggests confusion between the Hawaiian king and the Hawaiian people."

INDIANS ALL PEACEABLE.

Gen. Coppinger Says There is No Trouble at Camas Prairie.

WASHINGTON, July 3.—Gen. Coppinger, in regard to the alleged Indian troubles at Camas prairie, containing the following details:

"Lieut. Irwin, at Fort Hall, wires from Idaho, that reports of Indian trouble at Camas prairie have proved to be without foundation, that no more than fifty Indians (Lemhi and Shoshone), including women and children, are in that vicinity, and have committed no depredations; that he knows them to be peaceable Indians, and that no troops will be needed. In view of the above information I have received, I have ordered the troops at Fort Robinson squadron to Halley."
