BRANDING THE SEALS

DAVID STARR JORDAN HOME FROM THE BERING SEA.

The Stanford President Commends the Plan—Several Thousand Female Seals Have Already Been Subjected to the Hot Iron—Revenue Cutter Men Desert for the Gold Fields.

The revenue cutter Rush, with Prof. David Starr Jordan aboard, arrived here at 11 o'clock last night, ten days from St. Paul Island.

The Rush left San Francisco on May 5 and called here on her way north. At Dutch harbor she met Prof. Jordan and his party on July 21.

The Rush left the party, and for several days engaged in patrol duty about the islands. Thirty seals were operated about the island, but none of them had violated the law when the Rush left.

Jordan landed and made a careful examination of the herds and rookeries. While at Dutch harbor it was learned that three of the crew of the revenue cutter Perry, fired by the news from the gold fields, deserted, and stealing a boat from the North American Commercial Company, started across the open sea on a 700 mile journey.

Prof. Jordan expressed himself as greatly pleased with the trip and the complete success of the branding. He is at work on his report, and it will be filed shortly after his arrival at San Francisco.

Ed Gilbert, who shipped from Seattle on the sealing schooner Elsie, was brought home from Dutch harbor on the Rush. He developed a fever at sea and blood poisoning resulted from it.


