IS IT YELLOW FEVER?

The Dread Question Asked at Ocean Springs.

QUARANTINE ALREADY BEGUN.

State Boards of Health of Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana Hold Examination, and One Medical Expert Pronounces the Disease Yellow Fever, While Others Say It is Dengue Fever and Some Find Other Explanations—Cases Are Many, but Deaths Few.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 5.—The Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana boards of health have been at Ocean Springs since yesterday afternoon, examining the prevailing diseases made a week ago.

MOBILE, Ala., Sept. 5.—Yellow fever prevails to some extent at Ocean Springs, Miss., on the way of which according to a report just made by a board of physicians who have been making an examination of the patients and the place has been rigidly quarantined.

THE UNSHAKABLE DREIBUND.

But Humbert Will Not Quarrel With Others to Please His Allies—The Indian Army and the Hostile Tribesmen Massing Their Forces for the Conflict—The Amerer Fully Proves His Loyalty to England.

HAMBURG, Sept. 5.—Emperor William, in proposing the toast to the opportunity at the banquet at the Kurhaus last evening, said: "My army thanks your majesty for the honor of your leading a corps in the review, and I am glad to see that the whole German fatherland, arrests in your majesty an exalted prince, a close friend of the emperor, and a true ally, whose presence shows the world how unshakable and firm stands the Dreibund, which was founded in the interest of peace and which, the longer it lasts, will more and more become a guarantee of peace."

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QUICK ACTION ON GOLLI'S AVENGER.

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SATOLI'S NEW APPOINTMENT DENIED.

A GREAT CROP IN EGYPT.

CRISIS AT SKAQUAY.

Steps Have Been Taken to Break Up the Camp.

THE TOWN TO BE RAIDED.

Disorderly Element Will Have to Go—Refuge of Criminals, Confidence Men and Thugs to Be Broken Up—Miners Suspicious of One Another—Gov. Brady Will Appeal to the National Government—Spirit of Depression Seems Rampant—Serious Trouble Will Result Unless the Authorities Succeed in Moderating the Situation Within a Week—State Harbor Commissioner Chadbourne's Views.

The authorities of Alaska have awakened to the serious nature of the situation at the White Pass. They see in the continuance of the camp at Skaguay, as now constituted, possibilities for crime and various other evils of great magnitude.

BREAKS OUT IN A NEW PLACE.

PLACER AND QUARTZ MINES SAID TO SURPASS FAMED ALASKA.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 5.—A special to the Journal from Sedalia, Mo., says: J. W. Corkins, a Sedalia capitalist, and Leo Cloud, an experienced mining engineer of Cincinnati, representative of a St. Louis and Cincinnati syndicate, will leave here tomorrow for the west coast of Mexico to practically verify the value of gold placers and quartz mines which have recently been secured by the syndicate.

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THERE WILL BE TROUBLE.

W. S. Reife Says Miners Have No Money for Canadian Officers.

One of the most important letters to come down on recent steamers was that received yesterday by a member of the staff of the Post-Intelligencer. It comes from Linn Reife, son of Mrs. W. S. Reife, of Chestnut street. He went North several weeks ago, and since then has been engaged in trying to overcome the White Pass and reach the lakes. He says he is in better condition at the present time than ever before, and believes that the season he is on the Yukon bound for Dawson. He writes under the date of August 2, and closes with: "Tomorrow we leave with our last load
