VOTERS IN THE SCHOOL ELECTION MUST REGISTER AT ONCE.

Books to Be Closed October 27—Not One Hundred Persons Registered—Eight Thousand Voted Last Year—Election Will Be November 6.

Not 100 persons have registered for the school election to be held November 6. Last year there were 8,000 votes cast, or eighty times as many as will be cast this year unless those who are registered.

The law on the point of registration is perfectly plain. It is the duty of every man or woman who wishes to vote November 6, to register before the books are closed.

Section 1. No person shall vote at any school election, either general or special, who has not been registered at the time of the election.

The penalty for false representations in registering is imprisonment in the penitentiary for not less than one year and not more than five years.

The election November 6 will be for the choice of a member of the school board for the year ending June 30, 1898.
