FROM TACOMA TO THE DALLES.

Col. Bailey at the head of a New Railroad Scheme. Special Dispatch to the Post-Intelligencer. TACOMA, Nov. 3.—The Tacoma & Columbia River railroad is the name of a new company that will operate a freight and passenger line between this city and The Dalles, Or. Col. William Bailey, of New York, is at the head of the company.

The officers of the road have been elected and are as follows: President, Col. William Bailey; secretary, Franklin Everhardt; treasurer, F. H. Gorman; general attorney, Ira A. Towne; general freight and passenger agent, acting superintendent, E. G. Dorr; assistant secretary and auditor, William Bailey, Jr.; road master, W. H. Evans. A freight and passenger office has been opened on Seventh street and Pacific avenue.

The first work will consist in straightening out the Lake Park road and getting the roadbed in shape. Tacoma will be the operative headquarters of the new road, the head office being at No. 50 Broadway, New York.

H. M. S. Imperieuse Returns From a Search After Hidden Treasure—Rumor That England Will Send a Guard Ship to Occupy the Island.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 3.—H. M. S. Imperieuse today returned from South America after an unsuccessful search for \$300,000 in gold, silver and precious stones, which Charles Harford, who arrived from the Victoria, B. C., in the schooner Aurora in August last, claimed to have located on the island, Lieut. Lee and 100 men spent two days digging for the treasure under the direction of Harford.

the people must disappear; these encroachments upon individual liberty and private rights must end. "These are not the middle ages, nor is the city of Great New York Venice in the days of the doges. A city must have a city government; it cannot be controlled by village rules or run along lines. The sooner some folks come out of their dreams and realize these facts, the wiser, better, happier folks they'll be. "The eight-hour law should be enforced, and where practicable, resident labor should be directly employed. In all cases the prevailing rate of wages should be paid. "To the men I shall call to fill office under me I will be frank and plain. Put none but Democrats on guard" shall be the motto of my administration. Fitness and honesty and worth as a citizen shall mean to me the first demand in selecting men for an office. The men I appoint to office must own up to their qualifications. I must have proof that the public is to be honestly, faithfully and efficiently served; that no call of duty on the part of an official is to be denied and I must know that the men I name will do their wholehearted duty to such a large city. But to find a man for every place of appointment under me I need not leave the ranks of the party, and I will not. "That is my notion of city government, and by that I will be guided. I do not do this on any 'to-the-victor-belong-the-spoils' sentiment, but to the expressed will of the people. These latter have declared for Democracy. I do not understand the policy or justice of going to the enemy to select your officers. "While I shall call none but Democrats to places of trust and power in the carrying on of the city's business, this administration is not to become in any sort partisan. In doing my full duty to the public in that behalf neither I nor those over whom by my office, I have control, will know any difference of race, color or politics. As all should be benefited, so shall all share the benefits of government and find even, equal protection under the law."

Mixed Tickets in Utah. SALT LAKE, Nov. 3.—The Citizens' Reform party has elected a mayor, auditor and three members of the council. The Democrats have elected a recorder, attorney, treasurer and eight members of the council. The Republicans elect four councilmen. The vote for mayor was Clark, Citizen's Reform, 4,380; Dale, Dem., 4,380; Doremus, Rep., 2,200; Lawrence, Pop., 1,170; Hasbrouck, Socialist-Labor, 100.

Only Six Not Democratic. RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 3.—The latest returns from yesterday's election in Virginia give the Democrats all the senators-elect and ninety-four and perhaps ninety-five members of the house. The Republicans get four, perhaps five, members of the house, and the Independents one member.

Six Republican Judges. HURON, S. D., Nov. 3.—Returns from yesterday's election show that the Republicans have elected six and the fusionists two of the eight circuit judges.

New York Municipal Elections. ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 3.—The following cities have elected Democratic mayors: New York, Albany, Syracuse, Binghamton, Buffalo, Rochester, Amsterdam, Schenectady, Kingston, Jamestown. The Republicans carried the cities on the majority: Cohoes, Reneselaer, Tonawanda, Newburgh, Oswego, Utica.

Newfoundland Elections. ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Nov. 3.—Further returns from the general legislative elections show that the opposition party has carried the Burgess district, thus winning 22 seats as against 13 held by the government.
