

SENTENCE FOR TEN. PENALTY AWAITS THE MURDERERS OF ARROYO.

Grand Jury Remains Out for Seven Days Before Condemning the Penalties—Man Who Bought the Knives is Set at Liberty.

CITY OF MEXICO, Nov. 22.—The great trial of Arroyo's murderers is over, having terminated with the sentence pronounced on ten of the police officers and policemen concerned in the slaying of the hapless wretch, whose assassination has become the president's life.
