

ENGLAND ENTERS PROTEST.

CLAIMS ALL RIGHTS IN CHINA WHICH RUSSIA HAS. Takes the Position That Neither Germany Nor Russia Can Acquire Concessions, Exclusive of Other Nations, Under Existing Treaties.

MANCHESTER, Jan. 2.—The Manchester Guardian today says: "The government has categorically stated that Great Britain will refuse to recognize any special rights granted to any other power by any particular power. Any concession to one power must be granted to all or none. If Russia has been accorded the right to winter her ships at Port Arthur, Great Britain will enforce her rights to the same privileges, and her ships will winter there, while China concedes of course to concede the right."

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The Herald this morning says: "According to instructions received from the Herald, I have had an interview with Li Hung Chang, the Chinese minister, and he has expressed his opinion that China desires to make to the Western world in respect to the actual rights in the East. The great question is whether the Western world should understand thoroughly matters as they were. His excellency's views are given herewith in the following interview which he approved and which is a direct translation of existing treaties and of international law."

AN AERONAUT'S LIFE STORY.

Farm Girl, Ballonist, Wire-Walker and Would-Be Suicide.

St. Louis, Mo.—Democrat. "Mme. Adair," the aeronaut, whose sorrowful story has been told so often by drinking carboles and Monday night, had a varied and interesting career. Locally, she is known as a public performer, and a bicyclist, but her life has been heretofore various novel situations. Yesterday she lay in a small dining room on the third floor of the business block at 330 Franklin street, where she was recovering from the effects of the poison she had taken. The room was scrupulously neat, but painfully small—so small that she was unable to swing but partially open to admit the visitor. About the walls are photographs of the madame's professional triumphs. All her past life, she says, has been a life of adversity. She is known as an aeronaut, female roofer, bicyclist and athlete. More than one has seen her perform her feats of strength and agility. She has also made over 125 balloon ascensions in her life, and she has been in the air for over two years, given many public exhibitions as a bicyclist on the high taut wire.

Monday night, driven to desperation, she tried to end her own life by swallowing the contents of a bottle of carbolic acid. The arrival of a physician saved her life. Mme. Adair, the public knew her, a woman not only of great strength and agility, but in fact and glittering with the spangles and tinsel of a public performer. Among her admirers and those who have watched her private as well as public life, she was "Frida" Baum, wife of Jim Baum, raised in a quiet town in Iowa, and who had been a public performer in her own right.
