

FOR THE RELIEF OF CUBANS.

ANOTHER APPEAL ISSUED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The following proclamation was issued today:

To the Public: The undersigned secretary of state of the United States had the honor on the 24th of December to receive from the United States consul general at Havana a copy of the report of the committee on the relief of the Cuban people...

The gratifying interest which his countrymen have shown in all parts of our land in that humane appeal, has led the president to recognize the need of order and concerted effort, under well directed control, if timely assistance is to be given by the public to the sick and needy of Cuba.

It will be the office of the committee organized not only to receive and forward to the United States consul general at Havana such money and necessary supplies as may be contributed by the people of the United States, but to invoke in its own name and through the three great interests it fully represents, the concurrent effort of local relief boards of the United States and invite the kindly aid of transportation agencies of the country for the prompt conveyance of contributed supplies to the seaboard and their shipment thence to Cuba.

The consul general at Havana is, in the assured of the effective co-operation of every available agency in the island of Cuba in order that life may be saved and suffering relieved. The Spanish government, welcoming the aid thus rendered, will facilitate the work and to that end will admit into Cuba, free of duty and charge, all articles otherwise liable to tax when consigned to the consul general.

In the direction of the president, the undersigned appeals to the people in every town and city, local boards of trade and transportation, to corporations and others producing the necessities of life, to all whose hearts are open to the cry of distress and affliction.

Successful Filibustering Expedition.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Dr. Janoquin Castillo, one of the leaders of the Cuban junta, who is said to have been connected with several filibustering expeditions, returned here today on the Ward line steamer Niagara, after a successful incursion into Cuba.

In our party, said Dr. Castillo, "was Juan Garcia, a son of Gen. Garcia, who had escaped from the Spanish penal colony at Ceuta, Africa. After we landed we were joined by Col. Garcia, eldest son of the general, who had with him 500 insurgents. They were well fed, well armed and supplied with plenty of ammunition. The troops are disciplined and confident of success."

Another Spanish Loan.

MADRID, Dec. 8.—The Gazette publishes a decree today providing for an augmentation of treasury bonds by 2,000,000 pesetas secured by the customs.

Spain Needs More Consulates.

MADRID, Jan. 8.—The Spanish cabinet has decided to increase the number of consulates of Spain in China and certain kinds of the Pacific.

IN THE HOUSE.

Corliss, Hepburn and Clarke Discuss Civil Service.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The house devoted two hours today to the civil service debate, during which Corliss of Michigan, Hepburn of Iowa and Clarke of New Hampshire addressed the house in opposition to the law as it now stands.

Corliss favored radical modifications of the law. He thought the heads of the departments were clothed with the power of appointing their subordinates, and to that extent, he thought, the law, if tested, would be unconstitutional.

Hepburn spoke for an hour against what he termed the popular impression of the so-called merit system. The public, he argued, had been utterly misled by the high-sounding title referred to. In some things the old system at its worst was superior to the new.

Clarke closed the debate with some remarks in favor of modifying the law. He did not care to specify the modifications he would make. He was willing to leave that to the civil service commission. But "any old thing" was better than the present law, (laughter).

At 2 o'clock the debate was devoted to tributes to the life and public service of the late Representative Wright of Massachusetts.

At 5 o'clock the house adjourned.

JACKSON DAY CELEBRATED.

BRYAN IS THE GUEST AND ORATOR OF THE DAY.

The Burden of His Speech Is the Failure of Prosperity to Appear, Shown by Cuts in Cotton Factors—Lewis Denounces Trusts.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—A host of Democrats, quite a number of them from Iowa, Indiana and Wisconsin, celebrated Jackson day by a banquet at the Tremont house this evening.

He reached Chicago from Lincoln this morning, being met at the depot by National Commissioner Gabe and others. For an hour or so prior to the feast Mr. Bryan held a reception in the hotel parlors and shook hands with a large number of callers.

It is especially fitting that at this time the American people should recall the name of Andrew Jackson and his public career. We are engaged today in a contest very similar to that which he played so conspicuously and honorably a part during the term of office the national bank attempted to operate the retrograde of the people and control the government.

He grasped with it and overthrew F. A. Pickens, who was the president of the gold standard in the United States. In spite of the almost universal protest of the people, it seems that every generation presents a combat between the producers of wealth and the money changers.

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Not content with advocating a policy which places the 20,000,000 of free men in the hands of foreign financiers and permits a few London bankers to control our standard of money, he now proposes to give to the national bank full and complete control of the paper money of the nation.

In November, 1892, six million and a half of dollars against the retirement of the greenbacks, and seven millions supported a platform of "no more money" and "no more paper money."

He is seeking to control the money market, not only to the industries, but to the liberties of the people, than all the other trusts combined. At this time, and under such circumstances, the memory of the hero of New Orleans is being invoked in a new state, county and hamlet to arouse the people to a sense of their danger.

Twenty months have elapsed since we celebrated this day a year ago, and every month his heroic life has been a lesson to the people. Just after the passage of the law they were told that the party was in their announcement that prosperity had returned.

Mr. Williams began with a few remarks on the powers of the banks in politics, relating in that connection the story of President Jackson's reply to the advocates of the re-chartering of the bank of the United States when they warned him that the bank might prevent his re-election.

Mr. Williams said he believed Secretary Gage was honest and that he truly represented the president, who appointed him to office. He declared as a criterion of the Republican party the policy of the national bank currency.

The legitimate result of the issue proposed by Gage is to turn the question from bi-metallic to paper money. It looks as if that is to be the result.

The speaker warned the Democrats against allowing any new issues to be incorporated into the platform of 1892. A plank that might wreck the gold Democrats, he said, would drive many silver Democrats away and all the silver Republicans. The main questions that interest the American people, he said, were clearly and bravely handled in the platform of 1892, and the party must stand or fall by the utterances of that convention.

England Not Excited Now.

Quite willing that Germany should have Kiaochau.

The Port of Little Value, and Means a Great Expense to the Grabber—Nevertheless British Warships are Flocking to Chinese Waters.

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LONDON, Jan. 8.—The disclosure of the details and terms of the acquisition of Kiaochau bay by Germany momentarily scared the British public, which, however, now regards Germany's move with all the more equanimity as, in the opinions of persons intimately acquainted with China, Kiaochau bay is of little commercial value and will only be a source of huge expense for the "German Jamesons."

If the harbor had been commercially valuable, it is pointed out, it would long ago have been a treaty port, but it is said to be completely overshadowed by the close proximity of flourishing Chefoo. The province of Shantung, it is added, is entirely agricultural and hardly able to support its population, while the strategic value of Kiaochau bay can be inferred by the fact that Russia, in spite of the Cassini treaty, allowed Germany to occupy it. Altogether, Kiaochau bay is not likely to prove a bed of roses.

The British government maintains a spy-like reserve regarding Chinese affairs, and there are no further revelations of its intentions since the statement made by the Manchester Guardian, January 7, which was unquestionably the official view of the situation.

A conclusive illustration of the attitude of the British government is furnished by the presence of warships in Oriental waters.

In well informed circles it is asserted that it is not likely that Great Britain will formally protest against the lease of Kiaochau bay to Germany, but will confine herself to the significant hint given in the movements of her fleet that she intends to claim the usual part of Chinese concessions leased or looked as being additional treaty ports.

As a leading diplomat remarked to a representative of the Associated Press: "The statement of Berlin and St. Petersburg must be strangely unobscured, if they imagine that either the United States, England or Japan will allow them a monopoly of the plums."
