Democratic Leaders Begin to Plan for Another Fusion.

WANT AN EARLY CONVENTION.

James E. Fenton, of the State Delegation to Chicago, says that Eastern Washington Democrats are in favor of another Alliance with the Populists—Reorganization of the Party the Watchword.

James E. Fenton, of Spokane, the well known Democrat, is in the city to attend the trial of the Mallory case in the Federal court today. Mr. Fenton was one of the Washington delegates to the Chicago convention and was chosen at Olympia to cast Washington's ballot at the electoral college last year.

As far as I am aware, the Democrats have several no claim to the senatorship. There are several Populists who aspire to that honor, I believe. I think there will be another fusion in the near future.

Thomas Maloney, secretary of the Democratic state central committee, arrived in Seattle yesterday from Olympia.

Indeed, Mr. Maloney is a pioneer in fusion. He began advocating it early in 1896, quietly at first, but gradually spreading it among the Democrats.

"You can say that there'll be another fusion," said Mr. Maloney last night. "It will be brought about first in Seattle and then throughout the state."

TWO CHURCHES ARE HAPPY.

Funds Have Been Raised to Pay Their Debts.

BISHOP CRANSTON AT WORK.

Madison Street and Trinity M. E. Churches Have Long Been Hampered for Finances, but Are Now on the High Road to Prosperity—Members Respond to the Appeal According to Their Means.

Bishop Cranston rendered effective service for two of the Methodist Episcopal churches of the city yesterday. Chiefly through his efforts the congregation of the Madison Street M. E. church raised \$500 to be applied toward the payment of the church debt, and the congregation of the Trinity M. E. church raised \$100 to settle an old liability against their church edifice.

There was a large congregation at both the morning and evening services in the Madison Street M. E. church, and at each service the pastor, Rev. H. H. Gowen, Bishop Cranston delivered brief but stirring sermons on the fundamental principles of Christian doctrine.

The appeal of the bishop was so strong and so moved the congregation that a visitor who expected during the time the collection was in progress, the services of the day will long remain a bright spot in the history of the church.

There is still a first mortgage for \$1,400 to be lifted, the holder of which has signified his willingness to accept \$1,000 in full settlement, provided the amount is paid before June 1 next.

YESTERDAY'S HAND CONCERT.
