REGISTRATION IS LAGGING.

Business Men Will Not Take Time to Attend. ONLY SEVENTEEN DAYS LEFT.

Thus Far but 272 Voters Have Enrolled Their Names—Number Registering Yesterday Was 178—This Rate Will Have to Be Doubled to Reach 8,000—Who the New System Works—Who Applicants Must Do.

Have you registered yet? Unless you register you cannot vote in the approaching municipal campaign. If you have not already registered, remember that you have only seventeen more days in which to attend to that important matter. After that time it will be too late to register.

Up to 6 o'clock last night the registration books, which one at that hour each business day, showed 179 registrations for the day, with a total to date of 2,772. This shows that even as many as 8,900 voters register, the rate of yesterday will have to be just about doubled.

"The books," said a city official yesterday, "disclose the startling fact that the business men of the city are not registering. It is strange that this is true, since the place of registration is more accessible to the business section of the city than to any other."

"The Post-Intelligencer has already presented cogent reasons why the business registration clerk signs and files the little ticket made out as above by the clerk. At night the oath books are checked over, one clerk reading the name, ward and precinct of each applicant and another checking them from the map.
