CEASELESS PREPARATION FOR THE CRISIS

Statesmen Anxious to Gain Time in Order to Strike the Treacherous Spaniard a Crushing Blow.

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FRANCE IN DANGER FROM THE TUMULTS. Meline Asked to Stop the Rioting in Paris. HE MAKES A BRISK REPLY.

PARIS, Feb. 24.—The chamber of deputies was thronged today, and it was decided to request the premier, M. Meline, to immediately discuss the interpellations of MM. Hubbard and Gaudes relative to the conviction and the sentence of M. Zola.

M. Meline replied: "Popular, democratic justice has given a verdict after a military court, and you will accept it. Gen. Billot (minister of war) gave no opportunity to the generals summoned to testify before the tribunal of the country.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—The cruiser Cincinnati reported her arrival today at Barbadoes. She ran over from Para, Brazil, the reason assigned for the trip being the desire of the department that she take coal at an uninfected port.
