Continued From Page 1. The men at the fort are prepared to start at a moment's notice and are prepared for any kind of service. The same preparations are being made at all the posts in the department of the Colorado.

Improvements at Key West. WASHINGTON, March 12.—Civil Engineer A. J. Menocal has been detached from the League Island navy yard and ordered to Key West. This is regarded as significant and as indicating a purpose on the part of the navy department to make immediate and considerable improvements at the naval station in Key West.

At present the North Atlantic squadron is obliged to defer making any repairs that cannot be done aboard ship, as that state of affairs could not be permitted to exist in time of trouble.

Brig. Gen. John Wilson, chief of engineers of the war department, returned today after a trip of over 3,000 miles, which he accomplished inside of one week. Naturally his visit to Southern coast points in which extensive fortification work is in progress has excited much comment. Gen. Wilson declined, however, to discuss in any way this phase of his trip.

Artillerymen Ordered to the South. JUNCTION CITY, Kan., March 12.—Orders were received at Fort Riley this afternoon at 4 o'clock, detailing the three batteries of artillery at this post to the South.

Battery B, of the Fourth artillery, Capt. Anderson, goes to Fort Monroe. Battery F, of the Fourth, Capt. Taylor, goes to Savannah.

Battery F, of the Fifth, Capt. Riley, to New Orleans. The orders are such that it will compel the movement of these batteries to their new station not later than Wednesday of next week.

Major Randolph, who is in command of the artillery post at Fort Riley, has not been ordered elsewhere. There is great excitement here and at Fort Riley.

Telegraphic reports stating that the troops are already en route are erroneous. Proposals for Transportation. CHICAGO, March 12.—Quartermaster General Lee, of the army department, of the lakes, is making arrangements to transport batteries of artillery now at forts in the West to the Atlantic seaboard and the Gulf of Mexico. Today the Western railroads having headquarters in Chicago and St. Louis and other Western cities were invited to telegraph proposals for transporting batteries of artillery from Fort Riley, Kas., to Fort Monroe, Va.; another from Fort Riley to New Orleans, La., and a third from Fort Riley to Savannah, Ga.

Each battery consists of five officers, sixty-five men, fifty-seven horses and four guns, with caissons, battery forges and camp equipment, and will require one Pullman car, two tourist sleepers, three freight cars, three flat cars and six freight cars. Each battery is to be run, men, horses, guns and property together, in the train of one or more sections. The equipment must go through from the initial point without change, and will be ready to leave Fort Riley at noon March 16.

Acting Works to Run Day and Night. VALPARAISO, Ind., March 12.—The Aetna Powder Company has received an order for 100 tons of powder and 300 tons of dynamite cartridges from the war department. The works will be run day and night.

Government Cartridge Factory. WASHINGTON, March 12.—Representatives Russell, Hill and Sperry, of Connecticut, were before the naval committee of the house today to oppose the recommendation of the ordinance bureau for the establishment of a government cartridge factory. The bureau recommended an appropriation of \$50,000 for this purpose. The business of making cartridges is a large industry in Connecticut and Rhode Island, and the representatives from these states opposed the provision for a government factory as a menace to their own industries.

Spain Has Many Vessels for Privateers—Ninety Steamers Ready to Sail. Copyrighted, 1898, by the Associated Press. BERLIN, March 12.—It is well known in diplomatic circles that Senor Sandoval, the Spanish military agent in Germany, Austria and Scandinavia, who returned to Berlin on Wednesday from a trip, after having made three conditional purchases of coasting steamers at Plesence, and two at Pola, with other Spanish representatives, has been purchasing outright or conditionally, munitions and vessels for use against American trade. Senor Sandoval, in addition to the purchases referred to, which are intended for the privateer service, has placed large orders with the Krupp Gun Company during the last six weeks, and has also appointed a sub-agent at Trieste, to see what he can pick up. The Spanish agent is now at Hamburg or Stettin negotiating for several cannon and torpedo boats, built partly by Vulcan and partly on speculation by the Vulcan yards, and the yards at Elbing for the same purpose.

Thursday, Col. Reinlin de Sequera, the Spanish military attaché here, said he was confident the "misunderstanding" would disappear, adding: "It might, however, be well for Americans to know that Spain is not defenseless and that it will cost much more blood and more money to conquer or defeat us."

"So soon as war is declared a large and well-equipped fleet of privateers will immediately begin hostilities against the great American commerce. Spain has not remained idle since the first misunderstanding. Ninety different steamers lie in the harbors of Barcelona and Valencia ready to sail and do execution. We have friends, powerful ones, who will assist us, if not with men, with money, but I, in common with the Spanish government, trust that peace will be preserved."

IS A SUBMARINE TERROR.

The Holland Given a Thorough Preliminary Trial—Under Water Half an Hour. NEW YORK, March 12.—The submarine boat Holland was given another preliminary trial last evening. She moved out a short distance from the pier at Perth Amboy, and with John P. Holland, the inventor, the engineer and another man, disappeared beneath the water. She remained down a depth of about fourteen feet for nearly half an hour and then reappeared at the surface.

The object of the test was to determine the amount of ballast necessary for her operation under water, as well as to test her diving tanks and compressed air apparatus.

After the Holland came to the surface the inventor said that the boat worked satisfactorily, and that he was ready to give her an open trial in deep water. It has been decided to exhibit her in the lower bay next week.

CONFERENCE ON FINANCES. The President Discusses the Situation With Secretaries Alger, Long and Gage. WASHINGTON, March 12.—The president held a long conference at the White house about noon today with Secretaries Alger, Long and Gage. It is presumed that the subject of discussion was the finances of the situation, a subject which could not be fully treated at the cabinet meeting yesterday, owing to the short session.

MOVEMENT OF VESSELS. The Nashville at Key West—Supply of Torpedoes Arrives. KEY WEST, March 12.—The United States cruiser Nashville has returned from the Tortugas islands, and the survey steamer Bache arrived here today from Havana, via the Tortugas, with five of the Maine's wounded from the latter place.

The steamer City of Key West from Miami today brought two car loads of torpedoes and torpedo buoys. These will be laid in this harbor.

The torpedo boat Ericsson will sail tomorrow morning for the Tortugas with mail and dispatches for the fleet.

The yacht Buccaneer sailed for Havana. WASHINGTON, March 12.—The Marblehead arrived at Tampa today. The naval officials will not state the purpose of the Marblehead's visit to Tampa.

HAVANA, March 12.—Consul General Lee was informed as to the remission of the fine of \$500 imposed upon the American yacht Anita, which brought the congressional party here, because her papers were alleged to be out of order. The Anita was not allowed to go to Matanzas last night, a pilot being refused her on account of the fine. The fine will probably be remitted today and the Anita will sail later for Matanzas or Sagua la Grande, as she may desire.

INSURRECTION GAINING GROUND. Philippine Insurgents Secure Arms and Ammunition From Spaniards. NEW YORK, March 12.—The rebels continue their hostilities, says the Manila correspondent of the Herald. They have attacked the Spanish quarters at Sulig and Apolit, securing arms and ammunition. The northern provinces are aroused.

Many rich natives and half castes are closing business and leaving the islands. Natives refuse to pay taxes. The land lines in connection with the cable at Manila were destroyed on March 7, near Bulita. No particulars are obtainable.

INVENTIONS OF ALL KINDS. Department Flooded With Unique Engines of Destruction. WASHINGTON, March 12.—The war talk has had the usual result of bringing forth a perfect flood of suggestions and inventions. Many of these are most remarkable balloons, flying machines, kites and the like, centipede-like steamers with manifold propellers and torpedoes of fearful and wonderful destruction. All of them are given attention and referred to the proper authorities for investigation, but not much is expected from them.

SEÑOR POLO IS PRESENTED.

New Spanish Minister and President McKinley Exchange Formal Greetings. WASHINGTON, March 12.—Senor Luis Polo y Bernabe, the new Spanish minister, was formally presented to the president today. The reception took place in the blue parlor. The introduction to the president was made by Secretary Sherman.

The exchange of greetings was most cordial and occupied about twenty minutes. The ceremony passed without incident. The Spanish minister, on being presented, said:

"Mr. President—I have the honor to present to your excellency the credential letters which accord me in the capacity of envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary of his majesty, the king of Spain, in the United States.

"The principal object of my honorable mission is to endeavor, so far as possible, to maintain and draw closer between our countries the friendliest relations. In order to attain this object much in harmony with my own personal feelings, I am ready to omit no favor whatsoever on my part, and doubt not I shall succeed; and hope I shall be fortunate in getting the benevolence of your excellency and your co-operation. In obedience to the special charge of his majesty, the queen regent, I have the honor to express to your excellency the wishes of my august sovereign for your personal happiness and for the prosperity of the people of the United States."

The president's reply was as follows: "Mr. Minister: I am happy to receive from your hands the royal letter whereby his majesty, the queen regent, in the name of the king of Spain, accredits me in the capacity of his majesty's envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary in the United States.

"It is very gratifying to me to receive the assurance you have just made of your purpose to endeavor to maintain and draw closer in all possible ways the most friendly relation between the two countries, and in response to assure you that my own efforts and those of this government will no less earnestly be directed to the same high end.

"You come hither, Mr. Minister, with the prestige of a distinguished name, borne by your honored father, whose services in promoting good will between Spain and the United States have already passed into the domain of history. To this you add the qualification of a personal acquaintance with this country and its people, derived from your previous official sojourn at this capital, so that you have a double title to our confidence and sympathy. I offer you my personal good wishes, and I would have you convey to her majesty, the queen regent, my sincere appreciation of her majesty's friendly greeting, and my own desire that happiness may be her portion, and that Spain and the Spanish people may enjoy the blessings of peace and prosperity."

Senor Polo received a dispatch today from Capt.-Gen. Blanco stating that the condition of the Cuban reconquerados was greatly improved. Gen. Blanco stated also that he had prepared full data on this subject to be forwarded to Washington. It will be a timely contribution to the official material on the condition of these unfortunate people, and is doubtless drawn out by the harrowing stories of distress and starvation which have induced the sending of large relief supplies to Cuba by Americans.

Senor Polo has not yet opened business negotiations with the state department, except in the formalities of presenting his credentials. He is first attending to the several duties incumbent on a new minister after calling on ambassadors and ministers.

AMNESTY GRANTED TO ALL. Feuntes and All Other Refugees May Now Return to Guatemala. SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—Gen. Feuntes, one of the most prominent of the local colony of Guatemalan refugees, has received information to the effect that Acting President Cabrera has issued a general decree of amnesty to all persons who were driven out of the republic during the late President Barrios' regime. Further than this, so far as is possible under the existing circumstances, all property that has been confiscated will be restored. Gen. Feuntes, who is stopping at the Occidental hotel, is therefore making preparations to depart for Guatemala.

His secretary, Mr. Anac, stated today that the name of Gen. Feuntes had been regularly presented as a candidate for the presidency of Guatemala. The election will be held next August, and the three other candidates whose names will be presented to the public are the acting president, Cabrera, Ferrera and Terena.

WILLIAM UTTERS A BOAST. Declares That While He Is Emperor the Yankees Will Be Held in Check. NEW YORK, March 12.—A dispatch to the World from Madrid says: The Madrid Correspondencia prints the following telegram from Berlin: "I know from a sure source that last night at a family dinner party in the palace, at which was present Princess Irene, the wife of Prince Henry, the emperor's brother, who is now in command of the German squadron in the far East, William II. uttered really startling words in consequence of the conversation having turned upon Cuban affairs. The German emperor, placing the Blit of his sword on the table, said: "What I declare is that as long as William II. is emperor of Germany the Yankees shall not take possession of Cuba."

Not a Friend to Spain. BERLIN, March 12.—The Berlin foreign office has instructed the inspired press to deny emphatically that Germany will aid Spain in case of war with the United States, and has instructed these newspapers to point out that the United States is an excellent friend of Germany, and that Spain in the Carolina squabble repeatedly showed unfriendliness to Germany.

MAINE SURVIVOR ASKS A PARDON. Petition From Patrick Ford, Who Broke Jail at Omaha. LINCOLN, Neb., March 12.—Patrick Ford, an ex-member of the Omaha city council, visited Gov. Holcomb to plead for a pardon for his son, Patrick Ford, Jr., one of the survivors of the Maine. Young Ford two years ago was convicted of burglary and sentenced to fifteen years in the penitentiary.
