

HER ALLEGED RIVAL FOR THEFT OF HUSBAND'S LOVE.

The complaint of a sorrow-stricken wife against the alleged destroyer of her domestic happiness was filed in the superior court yesterday. She is Cynthia J. Noakes, and the woman whom she charges with the theft of her husband's love is Kate Keefe. Mrs. Noakes demands \$5000 in money damages for the wrong done her by her rival.

She alleges that in December, 1896, when she was living happily with her husband in Seattle, she was well known to the defendant, Kate Keefe, the latter, wrongfully intending to deprive her, the plaintiff, of the society and support of her husband, maliciously enticed him away from the plaintiff to a separate residence, and has since detained and enticed him to remain at the said separate residence in a state of adultery with the defendant, and against the consent of the plaintiff, and her peaceful efforts to prevent the same.
