WANTS AN OVERLAND ROUTE.

It is well known that there are hundreds of enterprising men who are nearest to the mentioned districts, has already signified its intention of getting into Spokane from Robson, and is presently over by Sir W. C. Van Horne, an executive head rated as one of the greatest James J. Hill, of the Great Northern.

RELEASE OF A BLOODY CRIME. COURT EXHIBITS IN OLD-TIME CRIMINAL CASES DESTROYED.

Ashton's Cart Heaped With Garments Stained With Human Gore. Half a Basket of Revolvers—Nordstrom Evidence Preserved.

A man's cart heaped high with clothing smeared with the blood of murdered men rolled out of the back yard of the county jail yesterday.

The four-sewing, moth-eaten garments, packed in disintegrating, composed only part of the evidence stored in the cart. In with the clothing were a thousand and one valueless articles pregnant with associations of bloodshed and crime.

Every article in the assortment had a history and each had at one time been used as mute evidence for or against a prisoner charged with crime.

One of the articles destroyed was a heavy 10-foot oar which A. Carey beat his dusky mistress to death in 1886, a relic hunter saved it from the ash heap and bore it away in triumph to add to his collection of curios.

The Van Alstine conspiracy divorce case remains in statu quo. Nothing has developed since the sheriff placed Mrs. Van Alstine and her sister, Emma Norton, under arrest on Monday afternoon and levied on the Noyes team and the furniture of the Yakima Washington street house of Miss Norton.

It is generally considered an absolute certainty that Judge Moore will find the two women guilty of contempt in order to pay into the court \$30,000 for Klondike Van Alstine's use, and will commit them to jail, but what the next move will be is shrouded in mystery.

COMES FROM EUROPE.

Frank Valle Believes 'Tis From There Aguineldo Secures Aid.

Frank W. Valle, in charge of the United States mails in the Philippines, sums up the situation in the islands in a letter written to Assistant Postmaster W. J. Colker on the day of the recent outbreak, which letter arrived yesterday.

"To one who has watched carefully the development of the independent republic in the United States, it is not surprising that Aguineldo and his ships are drawing their support from Europe and that from the same source an attempt is being made to create in the United States a sentiment antagonistic to the retention of the islands.

Since I began this letter I have been drawn into a great many discussions on the streets to find it reworked the insurgents have fired on the Nebraskans and Minnesotans and the responsibility of the war has gone to the front. It is nearly midnight so that the usual confusion incident to such reports is lacking.

COMMISSIONER GROU'S REPORT.

It Deals Extensively With Alleged Frauds Upon Laborers.

A supplement to his report of the work of the public employment office during the last year was filed by Labor Commissioner Groat yesterday.

Some interesting comparisons of wages paid in 1898 with those paid in 1897 are given. It is shown that there has been an increase in the price of labor in all lines.

The portion of the report dealing with the means of bringing about a public employment office and the private agencies of the city is very interesting.

Among the reforms Mr. Groat recommends is the adoption of a fixed schedule for all of the public agencies.

According to Mr. Groat's report, the best of feeling does not exist between the public and private agencies.

The total expense of running the office during the year ending February 28, 1899, was \$7,772.45, or 5 cents for each position as compared with 64 cents for 1897 and 21 cents for 1896.
