With the torrid sun of July in the capital city and an occasional downpour of rain that soaks to the skin in less than a minute, one can readily understand why the American troops in the Philippines are so glad to see the rainy season. YELLOW FEVER IN HAVANA. Two Cases Reported—Health of Troops Continues Good—The McClellan Held at New York. HAVANA, July 6.—Two cases of yellow fever have been reported today. Ludlow is satisfied it is impossible as yet to keep yellow fever out of Havana, but he believes it is possible to keep it out of the city at the southern end of First street. The health of the troops is remarkably good, and there are no reports of yellow fever on board ship.
