A \$50,000 SAILING SCHOONER.

Capt. Calne Orders Largest Craft of the Kind Ever Owned in Seattle.

Capt. E. E. Calne, the well known shipping man, has awarded a contract for the construction of the largest sailing schooner that has ever been built and owned in Seattle. Moran Bros. secured the contract, she is to be a four-masted schooner and her general dimensions are: Length of keel, 136 feet; breadth of beam, 23 feet 2 inches; moulded depth, 15 feet. The contract price is \$50,000. The vessel is to be completed by May 1. She is particularly a lumber-carrier, having a capacity for 1,000,000 feet. She will have the most modern equipment, such as steam hoisting appliances, a condenser and the latest hoisting appliances.

HERN'S FAST WORK.

AN OLD INSURANCE CASE.

Decision Against the Companies in the John W. Hillman Matter.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Nov. 12.—The sixth trial of the Hillman trial ended tonight at 9 o'clock, when the jury, after having been out for nearly eleven hours, brought in a verdict for Mrs. Smith, the widow of John W. Hillman, the plaintiff. The amount of insurance which the verdict gives Mrs. Smith is \$33,102. This includes the interest on two policies, one in the Mutual Insurance Company of New York and the other in the Connecticut Mutual for \$10,000 and \$5,000 respectively, with interest at 5 per cent. for twenty years. The case was litigiously contested and will be carried to the supreme court by the insurance companies.

The wedding ceremony was attended only by immediate relatives of the contracting parties, in addition to the Secretary of War, Melville Johnson, and Mr. Edgar C. Snyder, intimate personal friends of the groom.

WRECKERS FOR THE CHARLESTON.

Will Take Off Her Guns and Try to Float Her.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The Culgoa starts today, from Hongkong for the wreck of the cruiser Charleston. Naval officers here believe she carries a force of wreckers in accordance with the provisions of the act, and at least sufficient plant to make a thorough examination of the hull of the ship. If the wreck is in a shallow water, it is believed the Charleston can be floated. The cause of anxiety is the weather, which at this time is likely to be stormy.

KENTUCKY OFFICIAL COURT.

Session Officials Directed to Correct Certificates.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 12.—At Glasgow today Judge Jones held a session in the Nelson county case, granting the writ used for by the plaintiff, William S. Taylor, directing the precinct election officers that county to correct the errors in their certificate, and make true certificates of the vote cast in their respective precincts for William S. Taylor, of the republican party, as "William T. Taylor." Democratic newspaper figures today, for the first time, show a majority of 100 votes for Taylor from 115 counties, Jefferson being the only missing county.

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SENATORIAL BATTLE OPENED.

Senator Morgan and Gov. Johnston in Joint Debate.

ATHENS, Ala., Nov. 12.—The campaign was waged here today in the warm debates over heard in Alabama tonight. The participants were United States Senator John T. Morgan and Gov. Joseph B. Johnston. Johnston denounced his candidacy for Morgan's seat in the senate. The town was crowded with people from all parts of the state. At the conclusion of the debate Gov. Johnston challenged the senator to join him in all his appointments and to resign. Johnston's speech was devoted to Senator Morgan's alleged defection from loyalty, which the latter denied. Gov. Johnston criticized the senator's position on expansion, and put himself on record as against the government's policy in territory not contiguous to the United States.
