ROBERTS WIVES TO LIVERPOOL.

On the meeting of the president there is no new indication of any change in the situation. Telegraphing from Oshkosh today thanking the lord mayor of Liverpool for his congratulations in behalf of the city, Lord Roberts says: "I trust that my country's soldiers in this country will soon be able to return to their homes with freedom and prosperity to South Africa."

NATAL FREE FROM BOERS.

Unopposed and Roberts at liberty to concentrate his forces for further advance. NEW YORK, March 3.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: Gen. Buller in a dispatch from Ladysmith makes it clear that the Boers decided to raise the siege of that town immediately after the news was at the mercy of Roberts, at Ladysmith. The advance in Natal was only opposed to allow time for the Boers to ammunitions and stores to be removed north and west. That the Boers were not completely successful in carrying out this intention was owing to the fact that they were more of less defeated by Buller's victorious attack on Ladysmith. The battle, orders were evidently given for a hasty retreat to the passes. The result that a large quantity of ammunition and two guns were left behind.

KILLED BY THE INDIANS.

Two of a Party of Mining Rubber Prospectors in Brazil Finally Determined. PORT SCOTT, Kan., March 3.—Frank Reynolds, of Mapleton, Kan., who last fall came home from South America and secured the co-operation of the government in a relief expedition to search for the missing rubber prospectors which was sent from Kansas City to the interior of Brazil in February, 1898, has notified the state that he has received the interior of Brazil from Cuiaba, Brazil, in a letter he just received, that the entire party was massacred by Indians far up the Amazon river. There were five or six men in the party, which was in charge of M. E. Rice, a civil engineer of Kansas City, and consisted of Alfred Greenfield, of Mapleton, Kan.; two men named Williamson and Brown, of Ohio, and one or two unknown men. L. R. Price, a Kansas City merchant, was the financial backer. The Brazilian government assisted in the search.

MRS. STANFORD IS ILL.

Is Threatened With Pneumonia, and Physicians Are Anxious. NEW YORK, March 3.—The Journal Advertiser says: Mrs. Stanford is dangerously ill at the Fifth Avenue hotel. Mrs. Stanford was in this city from the West two weeks ago to attend to business affairs. Ten days ago Mrs. Stanford contracted a cold while out driving and the next day she confined to her room. Physicians were sent for and advised caution, although at the time the illness was not thought to be serious. Mrs. Stanford, in spite of remedies, however, grew worse. The fact of her illness was telegraphed to her brother in California, but the daily bulletins were such as to give him the greatest alarm. Mrs. Stanford's condition did not become really serious until two days ago, when the lungs became congested and pneumonia developed. As soon as these alarming symptoms became apparent, the physician instructed the nurses and Mrs. Stanford's secretary that she was under any circumstances should be permitted to see the patient for at least five days. In the time it is hoped to discover if the illness has been complicated by a grave character, so that relatives may be summoned to the bedside.

SERIOUS TRAIN WRECK.

A Number of Canadian Members of Parliament Injured. TORONTO, Ont., March 3.—The Montreal Express says: The Canadian Pacific due here today is today delayed by the crash of a heavy freight train and the coaches being overturned. Her Husband, a Wealthy Ex-Congressman, Scorned It. CHICAGO, March 3.—Belief in the efficiency of prayer as a sure cure for disease was the cause of the divorce granted to Mrs. E. J. White, ex-congressman, and a wealthy lumber dealer, from his wife, Miss A. White. The bill was filed in the circuit court on Wednesday of last week. It was suppressed from publicity. The hearing was held before Judge Rulhill, a friend of the family, on Thursday and a decree granted twenty-two hours after the case had been placed on record.

BIGAMIST SENTENCED.

He is Said to Have Married Forty Different Women. CHICAGO, March 3.—"I don't claim to be an angel, your honor, but I believe I have been more stoned against than sinning," said Bigamist Walter L. Farnsworth as he stood before Judge Baker for sentence. Farnsworth was sentenced to the penitentiary. Originally he was said to have forty wives in various parts of the country. He was indicted on four charges and acknowledged he had been married four times. Farnsworth was known as Bradford and other names. His real name is said to be Orton.

REPUBLICAN LEAGUE CALL.

Twelfth Convention to Be Held in St. Paul on Tuesday, July 17 Next. CHICAGO, March 3.—The following official call for the meeting of the National Republican League was issued today: "In accordance with a resolution of the executive committee the twelfth convention of the National Republican League is hereby called to meet in the city of St. Paul, Tuesday, July 17, 1900. Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote. Alternate delegates will be entitled to seats in the convention hall with their respective delegations."

Taylor and other state officials are preparing to set up a government there in the event the courts decide against them. Gov. Taylor says there is no truth in such reports.
