D. E. Griffith, the gold weigher at Fazon's saloon, had a lively ride to the first road house below Dawson February 3. A man befriended Griffith, and carried the Nome fever and without permission took a fine wolf robe and dog belonging to Griffith and made an early start.

Friends of August Martin report his death as having occurred on the Koyukuk June 22. He was an ex-captain of police at Spokane or Rosland, at both of which places he resided, and at one of which his wife and four children are supposed to be.

H. B. Levie left Dawson February 11 for Nome on a bicycle. He had a small knapsack strapped to his back to carry a few articles of clothing, the sum total of his baggage. Levie is a unique character, owing at one time the largest vaudeville bicycle and started to overland to Nome.

The biggest faro game of the year took place at Grand Forks last Friday night. The Dawson Daily News, Max Edelman, who arrived at Dawson from Juneau in the summer of 1897, sat down at the faro table and in a few hours lost \$12,000.

Edelman was one of the principal owners of the Gold Hill hotel, but lost his interest by this turn of ill fortune to his partners.
