

WANT SOLD DELEGATION. Opinions of Republicans As to the County Convention.

THE MAJORITY SHOULD RULE. With but Few Exceptions, the Bulk of Representative Republicans of King County Advocate Selection of Delegates in Such a Manner as to Secure Absolute Unity and Harmony of Purpose.

Opinions expressed by representative Republicans yesterday as to the question of the method to be employed in electing delegates to the approaching state convention, make it absolutely certain that the sentiment of the party in this county demands a solid delegation working with a united purpose and solely for the best interests of King county.

Expressions of opinion were obtained from each of the three gubernatorial candidates, namely, Senator J. M. Frink, Mayor Humes and E. Feister Gule. The speaker for themselves in their interviews, Mr. Gule was noncommittal, preferring to allow the convention to judge of the method of selecting the delegates.

Judge John P. Hoyt—The policy and practice of allowing precincts to select delegates to the state convention had its origin in the early days of the republic.

Sam C. Rathbun—I do not see any reason to go back on the established precedent in this county. Let the senatorial district delegations caucus and select their men for the state convention.

John Wooding—I am in favor of having the state delegates selected by senatorial districts, the majority of the delegation thus constituted to rule.

Thomas Fisk—Let the convention select the delegates so that it will be a unit for the man endorsed by the convention.

R. B. Albertson—Whoever carries the county, the delegates should go united for the man who wins. The only practical way is to appoint a committee to select the delegates.

Samuel H. Piles—Past experience has demonstrated conclusively that the best way for King county to obtain what she is entitled to in the state convention is to select a delegation which will be a unit for the man who wins.

Dr. A. P. Mitten—I take it that any man who accepts a place on the state delegation thereby gives promise of his ability to carry out the expressed will of the convention which names him.

Will H. Perry—I believe in sending one man to the state convention that is a delegation working as one man for the interests of King county before all else.

W. H. White—Anyone looking at the political map of the state of Washington will see the effect of King county sending a divided delegation to a state convention—no representation at either capital. This should not be.

I favor the selection of delegates to the state convention by the appointment from our county convention of a committee of fifteen, consisting of one member from each of the city and three members from the north end and three members from the south end of the county, this committee to select six delegates to our state convention, eleven delegates to each senatorial district.

E. H. Gule—I am a candidate for office. I do not deem it proper or becoming that one in such a position should attempt to influence the convention as to the manner in which it should select delegates to the state convention.

W. R. Bell—That King county, as a political factor in state conventions, has lost prestige is beyond question. A practical demonstration of this fact was given by the delegates to the last convention.

Frank Paul—We have been the laughing stock of the state long enough, because of the past six years we have sent split delegations to the state conventions.

J. H. Schively—I in my opinion the man who is endorsed by the convention should be named in the meeting of the committee today for the honor of being selected as the delegate to the state convention.
