EASTERN NEWS.

Mappelet Van.

Another River and Harbor Grab.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Western and Southern members of Congress are anxious to pass a river and harbor bill notwithstanding the failure of the Secretary of War to furnish estimates of the cost. It is feared that estimates of the cost will be carried forward to the next session.

Grave Robbery Excitement.

Philadelphia, Dec. 8.—An indignation meeting of colored people was held this evening over the recent grave robbery. When a trustee of Lebanon Cemetery, named Burton, appeared on the stand, there was great excitement, and several razors and revolvers were drawn, and nearly everybody shouted for vengeance. Peace-makers were sent to the meeting, but they were not heeded.

Man's Day.

St. Louis, Dec. 8.—A special from Charleston, Missouri, says Albert N. Anderson was hung for the murder of Morris Wing, also colored, today at half past one. Sanders paroled the man in three weeks. Frightful Train Accident.

Harrods, Va., Dec. 8.—A collision occurred at half-past three yesterday afternoon between a freight train going west and the express passenger train going east at the west entrance of Shenandoah's neck, the tunnel 22 miles from Harrods. Three persons were instantly killed, and five others wounded, two of whom are in a serious condition. The killed were Henry Ann, engineer of the passenger train, and Patrick Gobra, of Hinton, fireman of the same; Wm. Cooper, of Whitesville, Va., fireman of the passenger train. The injured are H. B. Thompson, of Washington, W. Va., conductor of the passenger train, whose back and legs were broken; John Madden, of Huntington, engineer of the passenger train, whose leg was broken and other injuries, but who probably recovered; the conductor of the Unionist sleeping car of Boston, whose name is unknown, but whose legs were probably fatal; newlywed man, name unknown, badly out; Stephen Cole, colored fireman of Louisiana courthouse, seriously injured; the passenger number 75, whose engine was broken; and Robert Bonner of New York, who escaped uninjured. The accident was caused by a misunderstanding of orders by the freight train, which they were attempting to take. More than had been allowed during the war, and alleged to have been to his own use.

CONGRESSIONAL.

HOUSE.

Washington, Dec. 8.—The House Committee on Foreign Affairs this morning authorized its chairman to request the House to fix a day for the consideration of the Nicaragua Canal and the Venezuela route.

A \$10,000,000 Fire.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Last night's fire was the greatest that has occurred in London since the celebrated wool store fire. Loss estimated at upwards of \$2,000,000. The whole block between London Wall, Phillip Lane, Adde street and Wood street, except the warehouses on the corner of London Wall, was destroyed. The fire is not yet subdued and the remainder of the block is still in danger. It is believed that persons were injured, some seriously. Foster, Porter & Co. had a stock of silk goods alone estimated to be worth \$300,000. The entire contents of the warehouse were burned on Wood street and Phillip Lane, and fell into the roadway with burning debris, filling the streets with burning debris.

Attacking to Star Routes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—In the Star Route case this morning, Davidge said the defense had no motion to make in relation to the array, and were willing to begin the argument as to the number of peremptory challenges to which the defense is entitled. A discussion then ensued as to the time of the argument and of its decision. A paper lately read before the Societe de Biologie.

A paper lately read before the Societe de Biologie furnished some results which may be of great use to agriculturists. A series of experiments were reported, intended to demonstrate the value of boiled and dried blood as an aliment for cattle when it is finely powdered and sprinkled into their ordinary vegetable diet. The method has thus far proved very successful with sheep, and a few calves have been reported to health by this means. As a means for utilizing the enormous waste from slaughter-houses the economic value is apparent.
