NEIGHBORING TERRITORIES.

Washington is not the only Territory making extraordinary growth at present. Idaho, Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico are doing almost as well, while Arizona is not far behind. Even the Indian Territory is growing. The great growth, though, is in the North, in Dakota, Montana and Washington. With our own growth readers of this journal are familiar, as it has been periodically told them through these columns. With that of the others they are not so well acquainted, but in the paragraphs following they will get a pretty good idea of it:

Montana's record for 1892 will be a superb one. With an increase of some 250 miles of railroad, opening a portion of one of the richest mineral, pastoral, forest and agricultural lands of the Territory; with an increase during the year of 15,000 permanent residents, and a thorough pass established among the red men, Montana has, in twelve months, received for nearly twenty years. This year the Territory produces nearly \$5,000,000 worth of bullion, more than 50,000 head of cattle and 3,000,000 pounds of wool. The harvest has been abundant and the prices better than for years. Some 50,000 acres have been added to the cultivated area. Important new mineral fields have been discovered, and almost 100,000 head of cattle and some 150,000 head of sheep have been put upon the vast stock ranges in addition to the regular increase formerly there. The assessed valuation of the Territory has increased about thirty per cent, and such a boom in the building of cities and the improvement of village property was never known. A geologist has predicted that Montana will be the greatest coal-producing State in the Union. She certainly will lead every State, Texas alone excepted, in the production of beef, mutton and wool, and many say of gold and silver. The field for new capital, new muscle and new enterprise is almost boundless. Emigration to such a country is success in life—a valuable right to emigrate there is a valuable privilege.

Hon. G. G. Moody, Judge of the Supreme Court of Dakota, in an interview concerning the advance of the Territory and proposed admittance as a State since the late session of Congress, says: Every effort will be made to have the admission bill brought up early this winter, and it is expected that all opposition will be swept away, and that it will pass both houses without delay. Judge Moody believes that Yankton county bonds should never have out the figure they did, but they will no longer be up as an objection, as the citizens have expressed themselves in favor of a settlement. All that is necessary is such legislation as will authorize the court officers to collect the necessary taxes through persons appointed by the court. This question is apparently taken out of the way by the determination of the county to pay the interest on the bonds. Judge Moody says showing of improvement since last winter in the present new State is such as was never presented by any other Territory, and must excite wonder, even in this country of frontier growth. Some of the towns owe their rapid growth solely to their superior agricultural surroundings, and some to railroads either built or projected. He estimates the present population at 275,000, or 100,000 more than last January. One hundred and thirty-seven postoffices were established in the Territory during the last year, and there are about 100 newspapers and sixty-five banks in the proposed State. It is expected that Senator Harrison will interest himself in the bill and strongly urge the admission, while Mr. Barrows and Senator Saunders are very much in earnest, and will push the bill with vigor.

Col. Fielding Lowry, late postmaster of Dayton, Ohio, is a conspicuous one of the debonair of official life. Before his appointment he was a sober and industrious citizen. He entered upon his official life under happy auspices but glorious ones tempted him to his fall. To maintain his official position he was dragged into the whirlpool of machine politics, lost his self-respect and entered upon a career of debauchery which degraded him and betrayed his trust and disgraced his family, first by dissipation and then by a course of courtesans with both companions of the lower grade and both sexes, and in the end by abandonment and suicide. His shortage was over \$300, which his bondsmen are now required to make good. He leaves a wife and three daughters no other heritage than a bad record for himself, culminating in a suicide's grave. This may not be the inevitable end of the place hunter, but it is the tendency.

THE LEGISLATURE.

THE PIERCE COUNTY COURT.

The Third District Court has been occupied continuously with the case of the United States vs. George Conway since our last publication, sixteen witnesses for the prosecution having been examined. Several more witnesses for the defense are to be called, which, it is thought on Wednesday morning, would not close its case that day. The defense occupies a large portion of the time in its cross-examination of the witnesses, and hundreds of objections and exceptions have been filed in the course of the trial. The defense shall call a number of witnesses, and the case will hardly go to the jury before the close of the present term. As Judge Green opens the LaCommer term on the 19th inst., the probabilities are that the business other than the present case will be transacted here during the remainder of the term. The following divorce has been granted: D. F. Wallace from Esther Wallace; Samuel Baker from Ida Baker. The marriage ceremony between G. W. Fife and Ella Fife has been annulled by the court.

MISTAKEN IDENTITY.

On the approach of the United States steamer Hasler to Port Townsend, last Wednesday during a heavy fog, the good people of that town mistook her for the Comus with the Vice-Regent party on board, and gathered on the wharf to accord the Governor General and His Royal consort a hearty reception. The Hasler was preceded by the United States Revenue cutter Walcott, and as was understood that the latter vessel would accompany the Comus up the Sound, the mistake was made. As soon as the Hasler got near enough to shore and emerged from the fog bank, the mistaken identity was realized.—Victoria Standard.
