Alexander Smith Cochran and his bride, a Polish singer known as Mme. Ganna Walska, arrived yesterday from Europe by the Aquitania. Their marriage in Paris took not only Mr. Cochran's friends but even members of his family completely by surprise, and caused a great stir in society and the theatrical circles.

Mr. Cochran's name was on the Aquitania's passenger list, but not that of his bride, and she remained very much in seclusion at the pier. He spoke for her, saying she would keep her contract with the Chicago Opera Company. Just before the wedding became known, it was announced that she would make her grand opera debut this season.

From the pier the couple went to Mrs. Cochran's house at 10 East Ninety-fourth street and there the singer spoke for herself and revealed the fact that her romance with Mr. Cochran, one of the best known of American yachtsmen and a member of the navy, was started during the eastward trip of the same steamer on which they returned from Europe.

A great deal of unnecessary mystery has been thrown around our marriage," said Mrs. Cochran. "Both Mr. Cochran and I were passengers aboard the Aquitania when she left here July 31 last. We met on board through mutual friends. During the voyage and later we saw a good deal of each other. We were married September 15 in the American Church in Paris. Only a few friends were present."
