

HARDING MAY GET 1,083,629 N. Y. PLURALITY

Miller's Lead Over Governor Smith Approximates 75,000 in State.

WADSWORTH 550,000

Congressional Delegation Will Have 33 Republicans, 9 Democrats, 1 Socialist.

4 SOCIALISTS IN ASSEMBLY

Republicans Have 119 Members and Democrats 27 in Lower House.

The plurality for Senator Harding in New York State probably will be 1,083,629. With 143 election districts missing the vote last night showed: Harding, 1,842,222; Cox, 782,593.

Nathan L. Miller's plurality over Gov. Smith may reach 75,000. With 133 election districts missing he had a plurality of 73,052.

Latest returns indicate that the final plurality of Senator James W. Wadsworth for reelection may reach 550,000 over Harry C. Walker, his Democratic opponent.

Every one of the Republican candidates on the State ticket got a plurality over their Democratic opponents in New York city except Mr. Miller and Jeremiah Wood, the latter running for Lieutenant-Governor.

Governor Congratulates Miller. Gov. Smith gave up all hope of election yesterday and wired the following message to Judge Miller:

through the ballot box and he had unfaltering faith in the decision of the majority.

"In my two years as Governor I have given the best that was in me," he added, "and the state of my vote registered the fact that this was thoroughly well recognized."

"I desire to extend my heartfelt thanks to the organizations, the independent bodies, the various committees and all individual friends who worked for me with untiring zeal. I am exceedingly grateful to the press and the newspaper men generally for their kind and generous support. This applies also to the treatment accorded to me by the newspapers that supported my opponent."

"I hope I may continue to live in the esteem in which they hold me and which they were so ready on all occasions to make known. I feel amply repaid for the long and trying nights of labor expended in my official duties by the generous expression of approval reaching me from all sides."

"I hope that Judge Miller or anybody else in authority will feel free to call on me at any time they think I can be of assistance. I shall always be ready to serve the State that did so much for me."

Before going back to his duties in the capital the Governor went to Brooklyn to congratulate his mother on her birthday. She had been defeated, but his vote showed he had many friends, and the result was due to the fact that the people wanted a change.

"He has worked very hard during the fifteen years he has been in public office and now he can take a rest," she added.

The Congressional Delegation. Latest figures show that the Congressional delegation from New York State will consist of thirty-three Republicans, nine Democrats and one Socialist, Meyer London, who won out over Fusion in the Twelfth District, on the East Side of this city. The present line-up is twenty-four Republicans and nineteen Democrats.

On the basis of present indications the state Senate will stand: Republicans, 49; Democrats, 10; Socialist, 1.

The Assembly will be divided as follows: Republicans, 113; Democrats, 27; Socialists, 4.

The Democrats elected only one out of eight Representatives in Kings county, four out of eleven in New York county and one out of three in The Bronx.

Six out of eight State Senators were captured by the Republican organization in Brooklyn and fifteen of the twenty-three Assemblymen.

In New York county three of the nine State Senators are Republican and two of the twenty-three Assemblymen.

Two of the five Socialist Assemblymen were defeated—Benjamin De Witt in the Third Bronx and Lewis Waldman in the Eighth New York. It may be that August Chismess was defeated in the Seventeenth New York, but that was in dispute last night. On the other hand, a new Socialist Assemblyman was elected in Kings county—Henry Jager in the Fourteenth district.

Friends of George H. Finch, Assemblyman elect from Columbia, complained yesterday that the words "Proh" and

"Bog" which had been placed after his name in the newspaper table, implied that he had been a party to fusion with those parties. Inquiry revealed the fact that the few members of those parties in Columbia having no regular candidates, wrote his name in their ballot at the primaries.


