

REDS REPORT PACT TO DIVIDE LITHUANIA

Moscow Alleges Treaty by Poland and Latvia to Partition State.

WITH FRENCH SUPPORT

Object Said to Be Complete Severance of Russia from Germany.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—A wireless message from Moscow says that a secret treaty has been concluded between Poland and Latvia with a view to partitioning Lithuania. The treaty, adds the message, is supported by France and aims at completely severing Soviet Russia from Germany.

FROZEN DNIPIER CAUSE OF WRANGEL'S RETREAT

Budenny Cavalry Crossed on Ice and Drove Him Back.

PEKIN MAKES MOVE FOR PEACE IN CHINA

To Call Representatives of All Factions to Reunite.

PEKIN, Nov. 6.—Plans for the calling of a commission, including representatives of the Peking Government and the defunct Canton Government and military chiefs, as well as civil heads of the Southern Government, have been made public. Its purpose is to formulate a new government embracing all factions.

BELGIAN TROOPS READY TO AID LITHUANIANS

Moscow Fears an Attack on Russia Is Planned.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—A despatch from Moscow to the Herald, the labor organ, says Belgian troops have arrived in Lithuania, nominally for the purpose of protecting Lithuania, but that a grave view of this fact is taken at Moscow, where there is no doubt that they are merely intended to create a new nucleus with which to attack Soviet Russia when the time is ripe.

BULGARIANS RETREAT AS SERBS ADVANCE

Refuse to Resist Early Occupation of Ceded Territory.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—The Bulgarian Legation here to-day received the following telegram from Sofia, dated Sunday: "Serbian troops have crossed the frontier to occupy the territory detached from Bulgaria by the treaty of Neuilly without awaiting the demarcation of the frontier and the settlement of numerous questions brought before the Ambassadors' conference in Paris."

POPE AIDS CHILDREN'S RELIEF

ROME, Nov. 7.—Pope Benedict in the course of a farewell audience to-day to Mr. Karl Joseph Schulte, Archbishop of Cologne, gave to the German prelate a half million lire for relief work among the children of Central Europe.

PROCEDURE IN FIXING GERMAN REPARATIONS

PARIS, Nov. 7.—The agreement reached by France and Great Britain yesterday upon the procedure to be followed in settling the German reparations question is received with satisfaction in the French press to-day.

CONFERENCE OF EXPERTS AND FINDINGS TO BE REVIEWED.

The procedure embraces as its first stage a conference of experts at Brussels; second, a meeting of allied and German representatives at Geneva; third, consideration by the Reparations Commission of the findings of the first two conferences, and, fourth, a meeting of the Premiers to consider the commission's decisions.

WILL GO TO RHINE AS RUHR TIME EXPIRES

German Chancellor and Foreign Minister Agree to Address Meetings.

Herr Fehrenbach, the Chancellor, and Dr. Simons, the Foreign Minister, have accepted invitations to visit the Rhine on November 14 to 16 and to speak in Cologne and Dusseldorf. This schedule brings the two more important members of the German Government to the outskirts of the Ruhr district on the very day when its occupation by France may automatically begin unless Germany has fulfilled the Spa agreements.

D'ANNUNZIO'S MEN ATTACKED BY SERBS

Fortifying Strait of Morlaeca Is Resented as Peace Parleys Start.

ROME, Nov. 7.—Just as the negotiations between Italy and Jugo-Slavia are about to begin, trouble has occurred between the insurgent troops under Gabriele d'Annunzio and the Serbs. On Thursday d'Annunzio sent Capt. Piffer, his first aid, from Trent with sailors and Alpine troops to occupy St. Mark's Rock, at the entrance of Morlaeca Strait, to prevent the Serbians from the opposite shore on the Buccari promontory from interfering with navigation.

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
