A. DANAS BEATS BULL IN CLOSE MATCH

Runner-Up to Squash Tennis Title Loses to C. M. Bull, Jr., 18-14, 17-16.

By SAMUEL J. BROOKMAN. Anderson Dana, runner-up in the national amateur squash tennis championship last February, met defeat in the third round of the annual open tournament at the Columbia Club yesterday.

After an exhibition that has not been matched this season for speed, skill and close competition Dana was eliminated by Charles M. Bull, Jr., of the Squash Club. The tussle ended in a straight game, but both of them were fought out to the last stroke.

Dana came from behind in the opening game, overcoming a lead of three points and "setting" the game at 13 all. Then he went into the lead, but Bull checked him at 12-10 and placed the game to his credit with a run of 3 in the thirteenth hand, the last point being a service ace that grazed the walls.

The second game Dana again trailed at the start 3 to 8, but a period of perfect stroking and remarkable "setting" carried him into the lead. A run brought him to 8-4, but Bull brought it back to 8-8.

Four of the best all around kickers in the country will also be seen in action Saturday. Thorpe and Guyon, the Indians, have averaged sixty yards in games, and each has a good field goal record.

DOUBLE HEADER IS NEW HARVARD PLAN

Crimson May Adopt Fresh Method of Preparation for Big Football Games.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 1.—The schedule for the Harvard varsity football team of next year, which is now in the making, will include several changes from that of the season just closed. It will consist of nine games, says the W. Moore, graduate manager of athletics, said today.

The six games preliminary to these will be slotted up considerably with a view to bringing new ideas and methods of play into action against the team that is representative of the Harvard coaching system at the Centre College.

Harvard and West Point alike wish to have the Army and Crimson meet in the big game of the preliminary season, two weeks before the Tiger contest, but faculty sanction in any of the several proposals of a meeting at the Polo Grounds, in New York, or alternating contests at Cambridge and West Point, or an annual game at either, is uncertain.

To introduce to the varsity campaign a host of candidates for places on the team, Major Moore plans to try to arrange a double header for the opening day, with Crimson players meeting two colleges the same day in separate contests of reduced playing periods.

One team already has agreed to meet Harvard under these conditions, he said. If this arrangement is completed it may find two Maine college elevenes opposing the Crimson players.

Fully Cross, which had the first date of the year's schedule may have the second or third next season. Valparaiso University will not return to the Stadium, nor will Williams in all probability. Virginia may be on the Crimson schedule again.

Applications for games at the Harvard Stadium have come from many institutions as far South as Alabama and well into the West. Nebraska, Syracuse, Indiana, Kansas and Missouri are mentioned as teams which may come to Cambridge, although not all these institutions have requested games.
