SINN FEIN'S PLOTS HINDER PLANS FOR PEACE IN IRELAND

Reports Persist, However, Active Negotiations Are Going On.

ABBEY TO BE CLOSED Public May Be Barred From Byways of Historic Westminster.

LEAGUE HOME IS RAIDED Premier Promises Proof Involving 'Republican' Army With German Conspiracy.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Archbishop Mannix of Melbourne, Australia, has been forbidden to keep a speaking engagement at Bootle, a suburb of Liverpool, next Saturday, and will not be allowed in the Liverpool area, according to the *Evening Standard*. The Home Office and military are responsible for the prohibition. Officials of the Home Office, however, refuse to say anything concerning the Archbishop.

having important results. It is declared that many documents have been discovered which disclose the complete list of the members of the Irish Self-Determination League, and also clues as to the whereabouts of men and women desired by the authorities.

Among the documents seized are said to be a number of letters coming from abroad, and also letters containing evidence of plots against buildings and various undertakings in London and throughout the country.

American "gunmen" have not been imported into Ireland to any great extent, was the opinion expressed in the House of Commons to-night by Denis Henry, Attorney-General for Ireland.

Uniformed men visited Killybegs, Ireland, and indiscriminately smashed nearly all the windows in the business section of the city. Damage estimated at several thousand pounds was done with small hammers and stones, says a dispatch to the *Evening News*.

The crime, it is said, appears to have been conceived in a mere mania for destruction, as the property attacked belonged to people of most conflicting political views and of different religious denominations.

GLASGOW, Scotland, Dec. 2.—The police arrested six persons of Irish nationality here to-day, three of them women, on charges of treasonable conspiracy. It is stated that gellignite, gunpowder, gun cotton, detonators, hand grenades, revolvers and cartridges, as well as Sinn Fein literature, were found in their houses.

DUBLIN, Dec. 2.—Police and constabulary raided the offices of the *Freeman's Journal* and conducted a ten minute examination of the composing room and of copy being handled by the editors.

SINN FEIN COUNTESS CALM AT HER TRIAL

Mme. Markievicz Eats Chocolates in Court.

DUBLIN, Dec. 2.—Countess Georgiana Markievicz, Sinn Fein leader, faced a court-martial here this afternoon, calmly eating chocolate while the court assembled. When her reported admission that she had participated in the murder of British officers and soldiers was read she contented herself with correcting the prosecuting attorney's pronunciation of Gaelic names.

While the hectic Countess thus calmly faced her accusers peace talk continued throughout Dublin. The most notable feature of this was a long interview which Arthur Henderson and W. A. Adamson, Labor members of the House of Commons, had with Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein and vice-president of the "Irish republic" in Mountjoy prison. It was learned that they closely questioned the titular head of Sinn Feiners whether he could carry out any promise made regarding a truce, Mr. Griffith reiterating the declaration he made to THE NEW YORK HERALD correspondent here last week that if the Dail Eirann were permitted to function it could restore order in twenty-four hours. As a matter of fact, this attitude on the part of the Sinn Fein may be the rock upon which the peace negotiations may be wrecked.

The charges against Countess Markievicz were that she conspired to raise a corps of Sinn Fein Boy Scouts, which organization has been charged with conspiracy to murder military police, carrying arms and generally promoting revolutionary tactics.

MORE AMENDMENTS TO HOME RULE BILL

Measure Meets Obstacles in Lords' Committee.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The Irish Home Rule bill is not having the smooth passage through committee in the House of Lords that was expected. To-day a number of amendments to the bill consequent upon the changes made yesterday were introduced in it. The changes included the amendment by Baron Oranmore and Browne, making the members of the Senate ineligible to election to the Parliaments and vice versa, and providing that in the event of a disagreement between the Senate and the Parliament, the Lord Lieutenant may convene a joint session of the two disagreeing houses.

Lord Shandon's amendment proposing a new clause in the bill empowering the Irish Senate to initiate legislation was opposed by Lord Birkenhead as proposing an arrangement both complicated and cumbersome. It was voted down by the narrow majority of 55 to 52.

The Marquis of Crewe, leader of the Liberal party, moved the omission altogether of the clause dealing with Irish representation in the British Parliament. Lord St. Davids described this as "wrecking the amendment," and reminded the House that Gladstone's 1886 bill was wrecked on a similar proposal. The amendment was voted down.

An amendment by Baron MacDonnell proposing to give full fiscal autonomy to both Parliaments was rejected by a vote of 62 to 37, after Viscount Peel declared the bill gave Ireland greater powers of taxation than any previous measure.

Mannix Barred From Speaking in Liverpool

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D'ANNUNZIO'S WAR IS TAKEN LIGHTLY

Poet's Soldiers Fire on Regulars Who Refuse to Be Drawn Into Fight.

TRIESTE, Dec. 2.—Declaration of a state of war with Italy, beginning Friday morning, by Capt. Gabriele D'Annunzio is not regarded in a serious light by military commanders here. All travel in and out of Fiume has been placed under restrictions and baggage is being thoroughly searched for arms.

Superior officers in D'Annunzio's army continue to have the best of things. "Things cannot go on this way," said a grizzled old artillery colonel to the Associated Press last night. "I hope the war talk is all a joke, for enough blood has been shed."

Gen. Cavaglia, commander of Italian regular troops which have thrown a cordon around Fiume, said to-day: "We have planned no action against the command at Fiume and there is hope that we will come out of this situation satisfactorily and without any unpleasant consequences. I am anticipating that a way will be found to get the command at Fiume to accede to the Government demands. There are still some persuasive methods at hand, and I think these will be fruitful."

"We are working to that end, and I am extremely hopeful that we will gain that end in a very few days. Until persuasion utterly fails we won't use coercion. Coercion is a last resort."

"So far we have not fired one shot against the legionaries of Fiume. They have fired many against us, and even against some of my generals. They have conducted raids on Government property, but I have given orders not to fire and my troops have obeyed."

"It is Italy's duty to rectify the situation in Fiume. I hope D'Annunzio will

see that Italy's duty lies that way, for her integrity must be maintained, or else the small nations will lose faith in us. We must be faithful to our signed agreements, and so cannot violate them; we must fulfil them."

The Italian fleet stationed at Pola steamed up the Gulf of Quarnero yesterday, maneuvered in the bay before Fiume, and then slowly passed very close to the mouth of the harbor, as in review. The warships, with guns displayed, presented a powerful appearance in contrast to D'Annunzio's little fleet of one dreadnought, four destroyers and smaller craft moored at the Fiume wharfs.

Some of D'Annunzio's soldiers on the shore emptied their rifles at the fleet, but no casualties resulted.

D'Annunzio's soldiers, who have been greatly stirred up by his appeals for the defence of Fiume, are taking the "war" situation very seriously. Their number is estimated at about 4,000, including detached units of artillery, engineers, cavalry, gas battalions, air forces, armored motor cars and machine gunners.

The cutting off of communication with Fiume by both land and sea is regarded as imminent.

HOME, Dec. 2.—The *Messaggero* says to-day that the D'Annunzio naval squadron at Fiume, which includes the dreadnought Dante Alighieri, was under orders to leave Fiume when it was learned D'Annunzio had blocked the port by sinking the cruiser Cortelazzo.

The *Tempo* says it learns from Trieste that it is not impossible D'Annunzio may change his ideas and that he already has sent a confidential envoy to Rome to explain his viewpoint to the Government.

Commenting on the situation, which it says is creating great anxiety, the *Giornale d'Italia* expresses fears that the situation may "resolve itself into a tragedy." It points out that D'Annunzio persists in opposing the treaty of Rapallo, believing that pact made too many sacrifices of Italian interests in the Adriatic, and that he is determined to prevent the treaty being adopted, hoping that Serbia's National Assembly will not ratify it, in which case D'Annunzio thinks Italy would again acquire complete liberty of action.
