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
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F. J. Earle, pioneer hotel man, who died yesterday.

F. J. EARLE, PIONEER HOTEL MAN, IS DEAD

Succeeded Father, Who Was Prominent in Business.

Frank Trumbull Earle, member of a family that has been well known in the hotel business and himself identified with hotels in this city for many years, died yesterday in his home on Soundview, Peter McLaughlin, Warren Hubbard, Edward N. Thompson, Thomas Moore, S. C. Koenig, Magistrate Morris Koenig and Thomas J. Nolan.

The Rev. E. J. Deevy, assisted by the Rev. Jerome Napoleon Bonaparte, officiated at the funeral service at St. Raymond's cemetery, The Bronx.

Mr. Earle's father was the late William P. Earle, who was proprietor of Earle's Hotel, in Park Row. A second hotel of the same name, opened at Canal and Centre streets in the early 60's, was an enterprise managed by Mr. Earle and his brother. In more recent years Mr. Earle and his brother had been in the management of the Hotel Hamilton and Bristol hotels, in New York City, and the Hotel St. James, in Richmond Springs.

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
