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Louyet Art Sale to Aid Devastated Regions of France

American Committee to Get Third of Proceeds From 113 Paintings.

Brought from Metz by his widow, son and daughter, one hundred and thirteen paintings of Holland and Italian scenes by the late Edmond Louyet are now on exhibition in the Anderson galleries. They represent the principal part of what the artist left to his family and in offering the pictures for sale here they did so with the provision that one-third of everything they bring shall go to the American Committee for Devastated France, of which Miss Anne Morgan is treasurer. The exhibition will continue until January 14.

"Among the pictures, but not for sale, are a self portrait of M. Louyet and one of his daughter, Rita Louyet, who is now here with her mother, Mme. Adele Louyet and brother Rene, who fought for France though very young and came out of the great war weakened and unable to undertake business.

The art work of father and husband have been arranged with loving care by Mrs. Louyet, Mrs. Thomas H. Haven, Frederic D. Phillips, Howard Willens, William C. Reick, Howard Townsend, Benjamin R.
