

MISS MARION COOK BECOMES BRIDE OF THE EARL OF MINTO

Americans Among 200 in Distinguished Assemblage at Wedding in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Jan. 19.—Before a distinguished assemblage of guests in St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church this afternoon Miss Marion Cook, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Cook of Montreal, was married to the Earl of Minto, son of a former Governor-General of Canada.

As the bridegroom is a Protestant and the bride a Catholic, the ceremony took place in a temporarily arranged chapel adjoining the church. It was solemnized by the Rev. Mr. J. E. Donnelly, pastor of St. Antoine's parish and the Rev. Gerald McShane of St. Patrick's.

Mr. Cook gave his daughter in marriage. The maid of honor was the bride's sister, Miss Dorothy Cook, and the bridesmaids her two younger sisters, the Misses Audrey and Sarah Cook. Lady Rachel Cavendish, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire; Lady Margaret Scott, daughter of the Duke of Buccleugh; the Hon. Marguerite Shaughnessy, daughter of Lord and Lady Shaughnessy; Miss Sheila McEachern, daughter of Mrs. Charles McEachern; and Miss Adelaide Beardmore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. N. Beardmore.

The pages were her four little cousins, the sons of Mrs. Gerald W. Farrell. Capt. Oswald Balfour, military secretary to the Duke of Devonshire and nephew of the Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, was best man, and the ushers were Mr. MacIntyre, Mr. Alex. Paterson, Mr. Hartland Paterson and Cadet Herbert Cook, a brother of the bride.

The ceremony was attended by the Duke of Devonshire, Governor-General of Canada, and the Duchess of Devonshire, who arrived here this morning. They were accompanied by Miss Joan Cobbold, Lord Richard Nevill, Miss Sanders and Capt. Kincaid.

The register was signed by the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, the Countess of Minto, mother of the bridegroom; Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Cook, the bride's parents, and Mr. and Mrs. D. O'Meara of Quebec, the bride's grandparents.

The ceremony was attended by about 200 guests, and the reception at Juniper House, the residence of Mr. and Mrs. F. N. Beardmore, by about 350 guests.

Lord Minto and his bride left tonight for New York on their way to Alton, S. C., where they will remain until the middle of February. They will sail in March for England, on route to Minto House, Minto, Scotland.

A large crowd saw the smiling couple off at Windsor Station and heartily cheered them.
