

New York Racing Fans Reap Harvest When St. Allan Wins Stake at New Orleans

Commissions From All Parts of Country Back St. Allan From 20 to 1 to 5 to 1.

MANY FROM NEW YORK George Starr, Sir Grafton and Two Pair Also Heavily Played.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 20.—It was a day of great sport at the Fair grounds this afternoon—race because seldom in the history of winter racing have as many good things been put over in one afternoon.

Four of the biggest killings of the year were made, the most startling of which was with St. Allan in the Blue and Gray Handicap. Commissions from all parts of the country, especially New York, were returned to batter the North Shore stable's candidate from 20 to 1 down to 5 to 1 before he won his last race.

Though he had been a distant trailer in his other outings here St. Allan kept close to the early pace to-day under Wida's clever handling, while the others, notably Botherton and Vice-Chairman, were subjected to interference in the peculiar lurching scramble throughout the race.

The Florissant stable cut loose the aerobically George Starr in the six furlong training race. He dominated the running throughout, but was tiring in the final strides and barely outlasted the unfortunate and poorly ridden St. Inver.


