NEW YORK, March 12.—GEOORGES CARPENTIER, heavy-weight champion of Europe, who is matched to box Jack Dempsey July 2, was Sports champion and said he was not prepared to say anything on that point.

"I shall return to Paris at the end of next week," he added, "and then I may have something definite to say." The Frenchman's manner gave the impression that he might not keep his engagement with Dempsey, owing to changed conditions since Cochran dropped out of the management.
