A collection of prints and drawings was placed on public view yesterday at the American Art Association preparatory to a sale at auction on Monday. The prints are headed by a large group of mezzotints by S. Arlent Edwards and the drawings by a group of studies by Armand Apol, a contemporary Belgian. Mr. Edwards, who revived the art of color printing by a mezzotint plate in 1911 and who has since that time been producing nearly 100 years ago, already has a number of modern followers, but remains the chief of his school in the eyes of collectors. Constantine, 202 West 86th st., Sunday afternoon, at 3 o'clock.
