TARDIEU BLAMES WILSON FOR DELAY IN MAKING PEACE

Clemenceau Aid's Book to Say League's Presence in Treaty Was His Fault.

LIGHT ON 'BIG FOUR' Frenchman Paints Picture of Conference at Variance With Lansing's.

PRaise FOR PRESIDENT Nobody Hoodwinked. No Trickery and No Principles Violated by Conferees.

An "inside" story of the Peace Conference told by Andre Tardieu is about to be published. The revelations made by Clemenceau's principal aid will attract as much attention, doubtless, as the secrets that have been told by Robert Lansing.

Tardieu makes it clear that President Wilson prevented the drafting of a summary treaty which would have settled the main question of peace speedily, leaving the League of Nations and other lesser affairs for more deliberate consideration. The President, he states, was "anxious to have only one draft, and not two, to submit to the United States Senate."

The French were particularly anxious to have a summary treaty, covering the principal matters quickly framed and put into execution, but in the face of President Wilson's attitude they were helpless and the British were too discreet to make opposition.

Concerning the maneuvering and personalities of the "Big Four" at the conference, M. Tardieu, in his forthcoming book from the Bobbs-Merrill press, has this to say:

"The tone was conversational. Neither pomp nor pose. Signor Orlando spoke but little; Italy's interest in the conference was far too limited as a result. It resolved itself into a three-cornered conversation by Wilson, Clemenceau and Lloyd George—an amazing contrast of the three most widely different natures that it is possible to conceive. Always sincere and straightforward, these interviews were at times almost free of their solemn simplicity and would then relax into something approaching gaiety when agreement was in sight. History will record with approval the ease with which the most difficult hours of the 'four' always spoke the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth.

Discards Legend of Trickery.

"I shared their life too closely to be able to judge them. Who better than I knows their shortcomings? I have no taste to blame them, for I saw them give the very best of their great minds to the task, and what more can one ask? I have no right to praise them. I shall brush aside the legend that one of them had hoodwinked the others. President Wilson has been said to have been written that M. Clemenceau turned the trick alone. These childish and contradictory explanations, convenient to politicians, must be abandoned.

GREEKS GO 8 MILES IN ASIA MINOR DRIVE

Take 300 Prisoners, 4 Cannon and Much Material in March on Turks.

ATHENS, March 27.—The communique from Greek army headquarters on the progress of the Greek campaign in Asia Minor, issued last evening, says the Greeks advanced eight miles towards Eski-Shehr and Afium-Karahissar, taking 300 prisoners, four cannon and a large quantity of material.

Greek airplanes, adds the statement, bombarded the Turkish Nationalists' airbase at Eski-Shehr.

The government has ordered the mobilization of all the employees of the State whose military service had been suspended. About seven thousand persons are affected.

U. S. CONSUL DETECTS FRAUD IN PASSPORTS

200 Emigrants to America Stopped at Cherbourg.

CHERBOURG, France, March 27.—The detection by the American Consul here of false passports issued for the United States has resulted in the stopping thus far of 200 intended emigrants, and has put the police on the trace of what is believed to be a well organized agency, catering chiefly to Greeks, for the supply of bogus visas.

NEW SILESIA FRONTIER STILL TO BE SETTLED

Decisions May Not Be Made Before End of April.

PARIS, March 27.—Questions relative to the new frontier of Upper Silesia will not be settled before the middle or end of April, it is declared by the Petit Parisien.

DUTCH TO LOCK OUT 12,000.

Strike Results in Order Affecting All Ready-Made Clothing.

LONDON, March 27.—In consequence of the strike proclaimed by the clothing workers, the Dutch Federation of Employers' Association has ordered a complete lockout of the entire ready-made clothing industry, according to a Rotterdam despatch to the London Times.

FRENCH-POLE PACT BINDS TWO IN WAR

Paris Backs Warsaw's Claim to Upper Silesia and Will Aid Against Red Attack.

TRADE UNION IS PROVIDED ARE NO UPRISINGS NOW

France Hopes to Follow Most Important Post-War Treaty With Similar Ones.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—France and Poland in their agreement concluded February 19 mutually pledge themselves to concerted action for defence in case either of the two countries should be attacked without provocation, according to a summary of the pact received here to-day in official circles.

By its terms France would be expected, it was said here, to support the Polish claims to Upper Silesia and would also be obligated to lend support to Poland in case of a Bolshevik attack.

Both Poland and France promised further to act in close agreement on all questions affecting their internal affairs, and each agreed to consult the other before concluding new agreements concerning their policies in continental and eastern Europe.

BOMB TRAGEDY CAUSES GREAT PARADE IN ROME

Thousands March in Protest of Radicals' Crime.

ROME, March 27.—Grief for the sufferers from the tragedy in the Diana Theatre at Milan, where scores were injured and more than thirty lives were lost in the recent bomb explosion, was expressed in a demonstration by several thousand Fascist, nationalist university students and others who marched through the leading thoroughfares of Rome to-day.

OBREGON'S RULE IS PRAISED BY CALLES

Military, Economic and Political Progress Claimed by Secretary.

ARE NO UPRISINGS NOW STATEMENT REFUTES REPORT OF BREAK BETWEEN HIM AND PRESIDENT.

MEXICO CITY, March 27.—A statement warmly praising the administration of President Obregon from military, political and economic viewpoints has been given out by Secretary of the Interior Calles, says El Universal. The Secretary concluded his statement by saying he was in a position to declare that "all the country has great confidence in the President's motives, and numerous letters and telegrams which he receives daily all bear the stamp of genuine optimism."

From a military viewpoint, Secretary Calles asserted, the country is in good condition, with no uprising of consequence noted, not excepting that of Gen. Francisco Murguia, "whose efforts are failures."

The political situation, continued the Secretary's statement, "cannot be improved on," inasmuch as various election disputes are being settled in an amicable manner, and "relations between state officials and the central Government are daily becoming more cordial."
